Description

The Southern Methodist Church Building/Upshur County History Center is a simple one story, wooden frame structure located at 81 West Main Street, Buckhannon, WV, within 1000 feet of the courthouse square. Originally built in 1856 as a church by the Methodist Episcopal South (Southern Methodist), it was then purchased by the Protestant Episcopal Church in 1891. It was this congregation that made considerable changes to the interior and added the front structures. In 1968, the structure was sold to the Church of Christ (Christian) and then sold to The Upshur County Historical Society in 1986 to be used as a History Center, museum, and archives.

The original structure has a rectangular plan, approximately 45 feet by 33 feet, of Greek Revival style, and gabled roof with return cornices on the back end. Three gothic arch windows are located on each side wall, non continuous sandstone blocks are used as foundation and the exterior walls are covered in weatherboard. The front entrance faces Main Street, with double doors and a repeat of the gothic arch window above them. The interior walls are plastered to the top of the wooden wainscot. The building is of post and beam construction.

In 1891, the second congregation did extensive alterations to the interior of the building and added a vestibule which is approximately 9 feet by 14 feet, and a bell tower three stories tall with a floor space of approximately 8 feet by 10 feet. Possible changes to the exterior front end may have included the removal of the return cornices and the addition of dentils along the gable. Stained glass windows were installed in the original openings and additional stain glass windows were placed in the rear wall (large gothic arch window), a quatrefoil window in the front gable end, and gothic arch windows in the bell tower room. Interior changes at that time included vaulting of the ceiling of the original structure room to a height of 18 feet. This ceiling is constructed of narrow tongue-and-groove wood sheathing, varnished, and contains a decorative frieze as well as wooden turn buckles serving as wall supports. Areas on either side of the altar contain varnished

wood gothic arch motifs in the choir area and storage room. It appears that the varnished poplar flooring and the painted wooden seats are from this era.

Since 1986, The Upshur County Historical Society has been in the process of restoring the entire structure to its 1890's characteristics. On the exterior, a new roof was installed using approved materials. Work has also included the removal of two intrusive interior structures added during the 1960's, one in the main room and one in the vestibule. Recent changes also include quary tile floor covering in the vestibule and the installation of a handicapped accessible bathroom in the bell tower area. Extensive work was done to restore the plastered walls, all approved against the standards set by the Secretary of the Interior.

In 1986, the structure ceased being used for religious services. At that time The Upshur County Historical Society proposed using the building as its History Center to house meetings, archives, and museum exhibits. Its location near the heart of town, its historical significance within the greater downtown historic area, and its proposed use, causes this building to take on even a greater significance. Its immediate area is in a residential and small business location. Since the major portion of thru traffic has now been removed by the interstate by-pass, this building's location is in a much quieter district.

Statement of Significance

The Southern Methodist Church Building/Upshur County History Center is significant for both its architectural representation and its role in local Civil War military history. This building was used for ecclesiastical purposes from its construction in 1856 until it was purchased by the Historical Society in 1986. Architectural changes made during this period were all within recognized ecclesiastical styling. During Civil War local engagements, this building played the most significant role of all such structures in the county. This building, through its proposed future uses, will continue to reflect both its architectural and historical significance.

<u>Historical</u> background and significance:

Located on Main Street (originally known as the Parkersburg-Staunton Turnpike, the main thoroughfare from Virginia, across the mountains, to western Virginia), this building, one of only two churches ever located on Main Street and the only remaining one, is the oldest ecclesiastical structure still in existence in the city of Buckhannon. Built in 1856 by the Methodist Episcopal South (Southern Methodist) Church on the lot bordering the grounds of the Buckhannon Academy (the first institution of higher learning in Upshur County, 1847-1866) the structure reflects a Greek Revival architectural style. This style is still evident today in the original rectangular section commonly referred to as the main room. Elements of Greek Revival are still in evidence on the exterior of the building with its return cornices, flush siding on the rear gable end, its original gable roof pitch, and the non continuous sandstone block foundation.

During the height of local battle activity of the Civil War, this building played a significant role on the evening of August 30, 1862. The building had previously been commandeered as a commissary (as had most such structures throughout the area) by the Federal command and contained "thousands of pounds of bacon, thousands and thousands of bushels of oats and corn", as well as "hundreds of sacks of green coffee." The evening battle became a Confederate victory and the captured Federal troops were first "marched to the courthouse where a guard was placed over them." "The 'Rebels' found the arms and ammunition left by the Federals in the basement of the courthouse which was the depot of supplies, piled them in the street and burned them. At numerous points on Main Street bonfires were built and guns, goods, furniture, boxes, wagons and every description of personal property was added as fuel to the blace during the night. After, the arms had been destroyed the prisoners were taken to the Southern Methodist Church on West Main Street" and the supplies that had been stored there were "taken into the street and burned by the prisoners." Confederate General A. G. Jenkins' field report noted that "We then commenced the work of destruction, at which the whole command labored assiduously until midnight, having destroyed everything of value, we took up our lines of march for Weston" (Hornbeck).

During the years following the Civil War, this building (no longer being used by the original congregation) fell into disrepair. By 1887, the second congregation, the Protestant Episcopal Church (of the Transfiguration), had begun using the building as their worship center. In 1891, this congregation purchased the building from a 'Special Commissioner of the Court' and began an extensive renovation of the existing structure. Between the years of 1891 and the consecration of the facility on October 11, 1903, various changes and additions were made creating a blend between the original Greek Revival styling and a late Victorian Gothic style.

During the time that an overall late Victorian Gothic styling was created, the following changes were made: the vestibule and bell tower rooms were added to the Main Street end of the original structure, stained glass windows were installed, the ceiling in the main room was vaulted, along with other interior style changes. It is possible that minor alterations were also made to the exterior of the original structure. Changes that were made during this twelve year period are all in evidence in the structure as viewed today.

Since 1986, when the building was purchased by The Upshur County Historical Society and ceased to be used for religious purposes, major restoration efforts have been made to restore the structure to this late Victorian Gothic style. These restoration efforts have conformed to the Secretary of Interior Standards and West Virginia Historic Preservation Officer guidelines.

### <u>Summary Statement of Projected Use</u>

The Upshur County Historical Society proposes to use The Southern Methodist Church Building/Upshur County History Center to house meetings, archives, and exhibits. In addition to these specific uses, the Historical Society also will use the concept behind historical property restoration, register listing, and the use of historical properties, as an educational tool in association with this specific property.
