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### **Summary Paragraph**

The City of Lewisburg, the county seat of Greenbrier County, is located in the Greenbrier Valley region of West Virginia. Lewisburg is situated in the southern portion of Greenbrier County. Two important transportation routes, US Route 60 (the Midland Trail) and Route 219 (the Seneca Trail), intersect in Lewisburg. The town developed from a frontier settlement to a small city with a variety of commercial, residential, governmental, religious, and educational structures and three cemeteries. The town lies in an area of relatively flat river valley land in the midst of rugged mountainous terrain. The commercial center of the town developed at the crossroads of US 219 (Seneca Trail) and US 60 (Midland Trail). Blocks become more residential proceeding outward in each direction. Both residential and non-residential buildings were constructed in a variety of architectural styles ranging from the colonial period to the present day. These architectural styles include Federal, Greek Revival, Italianate, Colonial Revival, and Ranch. The Lewisburg Historic District (Reference # 78002795) was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1978 and included 120 contributing resources and 78 non-contributing resources. The district also has nine individually listed resources: Old Stone Church (listed 1972), Greenbrier County Library and Museum (listed 1972), Greenbrier County Courthouse and Lewisburg Spring (listed 1973), John Wesley Methodist Church (listed 1974), John A. North House (listed 1974), James Montgomery House (listed 1974), Governor Samuel Price House (listed 1975), Big Levels Baptist Church (listed 1978), and Confederate Cemetery at Lewisburg (listed 1988). This district encompasses approximately 350 acres and now includes 445 contributing resources and 75 non-contributing resources.

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### **Narrative Description**

#### *Setting*

The City of Lewisburg, the county seat of Greenbrier County, is located in the New River/Greenbrier Valley region of West Virginia. Greenbrier County borders Virginia to the east, Monroe and Summers Counties to the south, Fayette and Nicholas Counties to the west and Pocahontas and Webster Counties to the north. Lewisburg is situated in the southern portion of Greenbrier County. Two major transportation routes, US Route 60 and US Route 219, intersect in Lewisburg. US Route 60 (the Midland Trail or Washington Street) is the major east-west thoroughfare and is lined with commercial, religious, and residential properties. Route 219 (the

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Seneca Trail and Jefferson Street) is the major north-south thoroughfare and also contains residential and commercial properties. These routes intersect at the center of the Lewisburg Historic District. Lewis Spring, a source of water for explorers and early settlers, is located on a lot behind the Greenbrier County Courthouse. The Lewisburg Historic District encompasses approximately 350 acres and over 400 residential, commercial, religious, educational, and governmental buildings as well as two cemeteries. These buildings represent a variety of architectural styles dating from the colonial period to the present day.

Lewisburg was originally laid out in a 4x4 block grid pattern, consisting of 16 large blocks divided into four smaller lots for a total of 64 square lots. These large lots have since been subdivided into smaller lots of varying sizes. The original plat map contained six streets: three east-west and three north-south. The east-west streets consisted of Main (now Washington) Street, Randolph Street to the north and German (now Foster) Street to the south. The north-south streets included Market (now Court), Jefferson, and Lafayette Streets. The residential, commercial, and religious structures with the earliest dates of construction are scattered throughout the original plat on large lots. As Lewisburg's population increased, additional subdivisions and streets were laid out surrounding Lewisburg's original 64 lots.

### *Building Types and Styles*

Lewisburg's central business district developed in a wide river valley along major transportation routes. Commercial buildings dating from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries are primarily concentrated along Washington Street between Church Street and Lafayette Street. A smaller number of commercial buildings also line Jefferson, Foster, Randolph, Lafayette, and Court Streets. Most of the attached commercial buildings are two to three stories in height, constructed of brick, and have storefronts with large display windows on the first floor. Specialty retail shops, restaurants, and professional offices occupy the first floor of the commercial buildings. The streets are lined with sidewalks and parking spaces.

Governmental buildings are scattered throughout the Lewisburg Historic District. The earliest extant government structure is the Greenbrier County Courthouse (No. 52). The current courthouse was erected in 1837 on lot number 7 and close to the street due to the location of Lewis Spring. In addition to county court functions, the courthouse served as the venue for the Supreme Court of Virginia, which held an annual session in Lewisburg starting in 1831 to serve residents in the western mountain region. A law library for the Supreme Court was constructed on the western end of town in 1834 (No. 79). This two-story, Federal style brick building shared a lot with the North House/Star Tavern (1820, No. 396) and was located along a major transportation route. When it was constructed, the surrounding area consisted of primarily farmland. Law offices also developed throughout the historic district in proximity to the courthouse. One of the early extant buildings that served as a law office is 850 Court Street N (No. 44), constructed in 1852. This one-story brick building served as the law office for Samuel Price and later John A. Preston before being converted into a retail business.

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In 1897, the Greenbrier County Jail, a stone structure was constructed on North Jefferson Street. The jail is no longer extant. The Lewisburg Historic District also includes three municipal government buildings. The Lewisburg City Hall was originally located on North Court Street but has since relocated to the former Bank of Greenbrier building (No. 410) at 930 Washington Street West. Lewisburg's fire department and police department buildings are situated at 200 Foster Street and 119 Preston Boulevard respectively.

Extant residential buildings in the Lewisburg Historic District date from the late eighteenth century to the present day with the majority constructed in the twentieth century. Residences are primarily detached single-family dwellings with a mixture of sizes, massing, and architectural details. These dwellings represent the spectrum of architectural styles found within the United States and West Virginia. The architecture ranges from log structures to large two-story brick residences designed in higher styles including the Federal and Greek Revival, to popular styles from the late nineteenth and early twentieth century and concluding with Modern. The largest concentration of residences was constructed to the east of the central business district along Washington Street with a smaller number located to the north and south. Residences sit back from the street to varying degrees and have well-manicured lawns with mature trees. A handful of multi-family housing properties are dispersed throughout the district.

### *Institutional and Ecclesiastical Buildings*

On Lewisburg's western edge is the present-day campus of the New River Community & Technical College. This large lot has a well-manicured lawn with picnic tables, shrubbery, and mature trees as well as a stone wall along Church Street. It consists of four education-related buildings including Greenbrier Hall (No. 35), Carnegie Hall (No. 32), Kyle and Ann Fort Arts and Science Building (No. 295), and the North House/Star Tavern (present-day Greenbrier County Historical Society's Museum and Archives, No. 396). Three of the four buildings rest on the hillside at the western end of the Lewisburg Historic District, overlooking the central business district while Carnegie Hall is located close to Church Street.

Two other education-related resources including the Greenbrier Military School (present-day West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine, No. 239) and Lewisburg High School (present-day Lee Street Studios, No. 217) are situated along North Lee Street in the northeast section of the Lewisburg Historic District. The Greenbrier Military School was constructed on land used for agricultural purposes and the Old Fair Ground. It is the northernmost resource in the Lewisburg Historic District. Its campus was located outside the settlement of Lewisburg and consisted of land north of Greenbrier Avenue, east of North Jefferson Street, and the majority of North Lee Street. Today, the main academic building continues to dominate the surrounding built environment, which is a mixture of green space, residences dating from the early twentieth century, and academic buildings from the late twentieth century. Centrally located along North Lee Street on a residential street is the former Lewisburg High School building. Unlike the majority of the surrounding residences, the three-story, brick academic building sits back from the street on a hillside.

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There are churches of the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, and Episcopal denominations situated in the historic district in the central business district and on Church Street. The earliest extant church is the Old Stone Presbyterian Church (No. 34). Constructed in 1796, Christopher Foglestone and John Brown built the first stone church on Church Street to replace the original log structure; an education building was added in 1910. Two brick churches were constructed on Foster Street in the early 1800s and became historically Black congregations after the Civil War: the classical temple-form John Wesley United Methodist Church in 1820 (No. 123) and the vernacular Gothic Revival style Mount Tabor Baptist Church in 1833 (No. 114). Historic twentieth century churches include the Romanesque style Lewisburg United Methodist Church (1905, No. 331) on Washington Street E, classical temple-form Shuck Memorial Baptist Church (1938, No. 397) on Washington Street W, and the Modern style St. James Episcopal Church (1951, No. 25) on Church Street.

### *Landscape Features*

The Lewisburg Historic District features two public parks within the central business district: Andrew Lewis Park (No. 145) and Lewisburg Downtown Park (No. 177). Andrew Lewis Park is situated on the northwest corner of Jefferson Street and Randolph Street behind the Greenbrier County Courthouse. Andrew Lewis Park was developed around Lewis Spring, an early water source enclosed by a limestone building. Lewisburg Downtown Park was constructed in 1998 on the southwest corner of Washington Street and Jefferson Street on the site of the E. L. Bell Building, which was destroyed by fire. This small urban park features brick retaining walls and hardscaping, seating, and trees and shrubbery.

There are three cemeteries, the Old Stone Presbyterian Church Cemetery (No. 424), the Dick Pointer African-American Cemetery (No. 425), and Confederate Cemetery at Lewisburg (No. 257) located within the Lewisburg Historic District. The Old Stone Presbyterian Church Cemetery shares a large lot with the Old Stone Church and includes graves dating from the town's early settlement period. A separate cemetery for Lewisburg's Black population was established to the west of the Old Stone Presbyterian Church Cemetery and south of Carnegie Hall. The Confederate Cemetery is a small cemetery located in a wooded area on the western edge of the historic district and includes a cross-shaped mass grave of unknown Confederate soldiers killed during the Battles of Lewisburg and Droop Mountain.

Historic stone walls are located throughout the district and contribute to the overall historic setting, feeling, and association. The majority of these stone walls are retaining walls in front of residences along Washington, Church, and Jefferson Streets with a smaller number found along Walnut, Lafayette, East Randolph and Lee Streets. Stone walls also line the properties of the Old Stone Presbyterian Church Cemetery and Lewisburg United Methodist Church. Historic stone walls, including those not specifically described here, are considered characteristic landscape features of associated contributing resources. The stone retaining wall and herringbone brick sidewalk along Washington Street East are counted as a distinct contributing resource as pedestrian landscape features associated with the road (No. 307).

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The Lewisburg Historic District consists of 445 contributing resources and 75 non-contributing resources. An intensive-level survey of Lewisburg found six contributing structures in the 1978 nomination have been demolished since initial listing and one resource, the L&R Railroad Depot, was recently relocated outside of the district. The majority of buildings in the Lewisburg Historic District are residential (about 280) followed by commercial buildings (about 100), and smaller numbers of religious, educational, governmental, and other use types. Approximately 10% of properties were constructed post-1974.

The earliest extant building in the Lewisburg Historic District is Jessie Bowlin House (1784, No. 337). Other resources dating from the late eighteenth century include the Lewis Spring (1785, No. 145), Bowyer-Grow-Foster House (1790, No. 398), a residence at 332 Lafayette Street (1794, No. 193), Old Stone Presbyterian Church (1796, No. 33), Gratton-Pare House (1796, No. 216), Thomas Edgar House (1797, No. 49), and "The Barracks" (1787-1807, No. 154). These buildings represent the early exploration and settlement era in Lewisburg's history.

### *Integrity*

The Lewisburg Historic District retains integrity of location, setting, workmanship, design, materials, feeling, and association. The majority of structures in Lewisburg remain in their original locations. A smaller number of residences and commercial buildings have been demolished. While the structures have been altered with new siding and roofs and replacement windows, the overall character remains the same. Lewisburg's two-hundred-year history remains evident in its large number of extant buildings and residential scale. The historic district conveys its significance as an important location for commerce and architecture.

The following buildings that were listed as contributing (pivotal or secondary) have been demolished since the original listing in 1978. Street address numbers have changed since the original nomination; the current address is noted in parentheses.

**Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph** (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

This document provides an update to the original 1978 National Register nomination for the Lewisburg Historic District, including clarification of the Period of Significance and National Register boundary, and a comprehensive inventory and evaluation of all properties within the boundary. This document extends the Period of Significance to 1974. It is not a boundary expansion.

The Lewisburg Historic District is significant at the local level under Criterion A in the area of Commerce and Criterion C in the area of Architecture. In 1782, the Virginia General Assembly established Lewisburg as the county seat of Greenbrier County. Lewisburg's central business district developed at the intersection of two major roads: the Midland and Seneca Trails. It served as a commercial center for local businesses, financial institutions, restaurants, specialty

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stores, and professional offices. Throughout its history, Lewisburg served as an important commercial center for the surrounding agricultural, coal, timber, and railroad industries as well as tourists.

Lewisburg is also eligible under Criterion C in the area of Architecture. The Lewisburg Historic District contains a dense concentration of residential and non-residential structures constructed in a variety of architectural styles including Colonial Revival, Ranch, Minimal Traditional, Federal, Greek Revival, Cape Cod, and others. Architectural styles range from the colonial period to the present-day and represent Lewisburg's development from a frontier settlement to a small city.

The Period of Significance for the Lewisburg Historic District is 1784 to 1974, beginning with the date of construction of the Jesse Bowlin House, the oldest extant resource within the historic district and concluding in 1974 when the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine opened on the former campus of the Greenbrier Military School. The Period of Significance of 1784 to 1974 covers Lewisburg's earliest resources dating from its settlement period to the establishment of one of the city's important institutions 50 years ago.

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**Narrative Statement of Significance** (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

### **Criterion A**

The Lewisburg Historic District is significant at the local level under Criterion A: Commerce. Lewisburg's central business district developed along major transportation routes at the intersection of the Midland and Seneca Trails. Early commercial buildings including taverns, inns, and shops were constructed along these major transportation routes and geared towards tourists who were visiting from nearby springs, attorneys and judges who were attending court, and drovers who were transporting cattle and crops to markets. Throughout the 1800s, industries such as tanneries, glove making, and wood working developed along the Seneca Trail.

### **Criterion C**

The Lewisburg Historic District is locally significant under Criterion C: Architecture. The majority of buildings in Lewisburg represent important, popular architectural styles and forms dating from the colonial period to the present day, including log cabins, Federal, Greek Revival, Colonial Revival, Italianate, Victorian, Cape Cod, Craftsman Bungalow, and Ranch. A number of the early extant resources are credited to John Weir and John Dunn, two early brick masons and architects. The styles and forms of the residential and commercial buildings of Lewisburg illustrate the town's history from its importance as a colonial town, site of early courts in western Virginia, and private education to becoming a commercial center along the Midland and Seneca Trails to its variety of residencies and businesses in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

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## Background and Previous Documentation

The Lewisburg Historic District was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. The nomination document inventoried 198 total resources including 120 contributing resources (using the obsolete designations of 66 “pivotal” and 54 “secondary” structures) and 78 non-contributing resources (“non-conforming intrusions”). Some of the remaining buildings were identified in accompanying sketch maps as neutral structures, neither contributing or non-contributing. It was difficult to determine a property’s eligibility based on the accompanying sketch maps. The nomination also provided a list of Inclusive Street Numbers, indicating the extent of the district based on ranges of street addresses, but did not include a comprehensive individual inventory of every property within the district. The Period of Significance was unspecified, although it is assumed to have ended in 1928, 50 years prior. Since 1978, additional resources with a date of construction after 1928 have become eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, the National Register boundary was unclear; the boundary specified by the UTM points differs from the boundary provided in the sketch map. Both versions of the boundary cut through parcels. This nomination clarifies the National Register boundaries, establishes a Period of Significance, and provides a comprehensive inventory of all properties within the boundary.

## Historic Context

### *Exploration and Early Settlement*

The Greenbrier Valley around Lewisburg was utilized by indigenous people including the Six Nations of the Iroquois and Western Cayuga and Seneca (called Mingo by European settlers). These tribes used early trails including the Midland Trail and Seneca Trail for communication, hunting, trading, and traveling purposes.<sup>1</sup> Early European explorers and surveyors traveled along the same trails as they explored the Greenbrier Valley in the early to mid-eighteenth century.

In 1745, Virginia granted 100,000 acres of land in the Greenbrier Valley to the Greenbrier Company, a land speculator.<sup>2</sup> The Greenbrier Valley included land along the Greenbrier River in present-day Greenbrier, Pocahontas, and Monroe counties in West Virginia.<sup>3</sup> Andrew Lewis, an early explorer and captain in the Orange County, Virginia militia<sup>4</sup>, surveyed the area before the Greenbrier Company started promoting the land to potential settlers. During this survey, Lewis and other surveyors discovered a clear spring in present day Lewisburg.<sup>5</sup> Settlers began moving into the Greenbrier Valley in the early 1750s. These early settlements included one in the “Big Levels” area (near present-day Lewisburg), Muddy Creek, and McDowell Bottoms outside of

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Alderson. However, attacks by indigenous people resulted in settlers leaving the area and settling instead in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley.

In 1774, Virginia Governor Lord Dunmore ordered a mission to prevent a rumored attack by indigenous people as territorial conflicts increased. One part of his plan ordered over 1,000 militiamen from nearby counties to meet at Camp Union, Col. Andrew Lewis' Virginia Militia camp, near Lewisburg. Under the leadership of Andrew Lewis, now a colonel, the militiamen marched westward towards Point Pleasant, where they battled with Mingo and Shawnee warriors. Some of the militiamen settled in Lewisburg after the war. A number of factors contributed to the town's growth including the militia's presence in the area, an increased number of forts in the Greenbrier Valley, and improved trade.

Greenbrier County was originally partitioned from portions of Montgomery and Botetourt Counties in present-day Virginia. The Virginia General Assembly passed an act creating Greenbrier County in 1777 and the county was officially formed in 1778. Its original boundaries stretched west from the Allegheny Mountains to the Ohio River and encompassed seventeen counties in present-day central and western West Virginia.<sup>6</sup> This act also established the location for the courthouse at Colonel John Stuart's house and the day court would be held. The earliest recorded meeting at the courthouse took place during the November 1782 term.<sup>7</sup>

In the 1750s, there were two documented forts located within the Greenbrier Valley: Baughman's Fort, west of Alderson and one at Marlin's, possibly in Marlinton in Pocahontas County. Other forts were constructed in the Greenbrier Valley in 1774 such as Arbuckle's Fort on John Keeny's property at the confluence of Mills and Muddy Creeks.<sup>8</sup> A fort was not located in Lewisburg until Captain John Stuart (Stewart) constructed one between 1776 and 1777. It was referred to as the "fort at Camp Union," "fort on the levels," "Fort Charles on the levels", or "Fort Charles"; by the 1830s this fort is referred to "the Savannah Fort" or Fort Savannah in Revolutionary War pension applications.<sup>9</sup>

### *Early Development of Lewisburg*

On October 7, 1782, the Virginia General Assembly passed an act establishing the town of Lewisburg, named in honor of Andrew Lewis. Lewisburg encompassed a total of 40 acres of land that were divided into streets with half-acre lots.<sup>10</sup> Three east-west and three north-south streets were designated. The act also required buyers to construct a dwelling 20 feet by 16 feet with a stone or brick chimney within four years of the date of purchase. Following passage of this act, surveyor Captain Thomas Edgar (1750-1822) was selected to lay out the town. Edgar laid out Lewisburg in a grid pattern with 16 large blocks each divided into 4 smaller lots for a

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total of 64 lots. The plat map included six streets including Market (now Court), Jefferson, Lafayette, Randolph, Washington, and German Streets (now Foster).

This act also required the trustees named in the legislation to sell the remaining lots at public auction. According to trustee John Reid's records, 28 of the 64 lots were sold at public auction in 1784 with another 8 sold three years later in 1787.<sup>11</sup> Some of the buyers purchased multiple lots but did not immediately build on all of them. The first permanent settlers in Lewisburg included Captain Mathew Arbuckle, John Lockhart, Thomas Renick, and Thomas Edgar.

Early settlers constructed one-story log cabins and businesses along major transportation routes and near Lewis Spring which is located behind the Greenbrier County Courthouse. A small limestone building was constructed to protect the spring in the late eighteenth century. Two-story log buildings were later constructed along Washington Street, also known as the Midland Trail and US Route 60, the successors of the James River and Kanawha Turnpike. Some of the log buildings are extant and have been covered with weatherboard.

Early construction in Lewisburg also consisted of a small number of stone structures that were located near the Midland Trail. The first stone residence constructed in Lewisburg was the Thomas Edgar House located at 895 North Court Street (No. 229). In the early 1790s, Edgar resided in a two-story, Federal-style residence measuring 20 feet by 16 feet with an exterior stone chimney. Constructed in 1796, the Old Stone Church (No.33) at 644 Church Street was another early stone structure. This two-story church building replaced an earlier log cabin. Colonel Stuart carved a stone with the message "This building was erected in the year 1796 at the expense of a few of the first inhabitants of this land to commemorate their affection and esteem for the gospel of Jesus Christ; reader if you are inclined to applaud their virtues give God the glory" that was placed above the church's entrance.

One of the primary methods of transportation for early settlers and farmers was narrow, dirt roads. In 1781, the first public road between Warm Springs, Virginia and Lewisburg was constructed. The exact location of this road is not described in detail but based on early maps, it may have roughly followed the present-day routes Interstate 64 to Callaghan, Virginia and US 220 to Warm Springs.<sup>12</sup> Another early road was constructed between Lewisburg and Kanawha County for traveling and trading purposes. In 1785, construction of the Old State Road, the predecessor of the James River and Kanawha Turnpike and Midland Trail, began. This road followed the route taken by Colonel Andrew Lewis to Kanawha Falls then to Point Pleasant.

In 1790, the first census counted the residents of the United States. However, Virginia's records from the 1790 and 1800 censuses were destroyed during the War of 1812 when the British

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burned Washington. Available tax records for Greenbrier County between 1783 to 1786 show the population was 6,015 people including 319 enslaved people.<sup>13</sup>

### *Nineteenth Century*

In the late eighteenth and early nineteenth century, Greenbrier County's economy was agriculture-based. Early residents of Lewisburg grew crops such as corn, potatoes, and wheat and raised cattle, hogs, and horses. The soil found in the Greenbrier Valley was rich in nutrients and provided fertile pastureland for raising livestock, particularly horses. Some Lewisburg residents owned enslaved people who worked on the farms and plantations while other enslaved people performed skilled and unskilled labor in industries such as brickmaking. Enslaved people also worked at the "Old White" – the present-day Greenbrier Resort in White Sulphur Springs – and other nearby resorts.<sup>14</sup>

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


Figure 1: 1825 Map of Lewisburg showing businesses and industries. (Source: Greenbrier County Historical Society)

Early development in Lewisburg included the construction of educational, industrial, governmental, religious, and commercial buildings. Private education in Lewisburg can be traced to the early 1800s when Dr. John McElhenney, pastor of the Old Stone Church, established the first private school. Oral tradition noted he opened this school in 1810 inside his home to educate young men in the classics. While a two-story, brick building was constructed on Church Street in 1812, Greenbrier County residents petitioned the Virginia General Assembly to incorporate the Lewisburg Academy, the school founded by McElhenney.<sup>15</sup> The Virginia General Assembly chartered the Lewisburg Academy, a co-educational institution, the same year. Architect and brick mason John Weir constructed the first two-story, brick school, the first brick building in Lewisburg.<sup>16</sup> It was destroyed by fire and by 1861, it was rebuilt. Figure 1 shows the location of the Lewisburg Academy in 1825.

An industrial area developed in Lewisburg along the Seneca Trail on the site of present-day Montwell Commons. This area had a number of facilities that manufactured products including gloves, chairs, spinning wheels, and shoes.<sup>17</sup> In the early 1800s, William Morrow, a tailor, opened a tannery north of “The Barracks” on North Jefferson Street to manufacture leather. He later sold the lot to James Withrow who also operated a successful tannery on the site.<sup>18</sup> Another early businessman was Hugh Donnally who manufactured gloves from buckskin and other animals for men and women. The Donnally Glove Factory also operated at the Montwell Commons site.<sup>19</sup> Donnally sold the gloves in Lewisburg, to guests of the Greenbrier Resort, and to customers when he traveled to New York.<sup>20</sup> Wood products were also manufactured in Lewisburg. Tommie Henning, a cabinet maker and painter, produced chairs, spinning wheels,

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and cabinets from local timber at his business.<sup>21</sup> He sold his chairs throughout Greenbrier County including to the “Old White.”<sup>22</sup>

Growing commerce and the demand for better roads led to the construction of turnpikes. In 1820, the Virginia General Assembly passed legislation authorizing the James River Company to erect a road between the James and Great Falls of the Kanawha near present-day Gauley Bridge in Fayette County. The selected route for the James & Kanawha River Turnpike, an east-west toll road, ran parallel to its predecessor the Old State Road. It was located on the north side of the New and Kanawha Rivers and traveled through Greenbrier and Fayette counties.<sup>23</sup> Construction of this turnpike was completed in 1822. Stagecoaches transported passengers, mail, and freight along the James & Kanawha River Turnpike with stops in Lewisburg. Lewisburg’s built environment included taverns, inns, and livery stables to accommodate travelers and drovers who transported cattle and other livestock to markets.

In the early 1830s, two buildings related to Lewisburg’s role as the site of court and the county seat were constructed. The Virginia General Assembly passed legislation in 1831 requiring the Supreme Court of Appeals to hold an annual session in Lewisburg during the month of July.<sup>24</sup> The Western Division of the Supreme Court of Appeals was established to serve the people living west of the Allegheny Mountains. Both lawyers and jurists traveled to Lewisburg to attend court. Seeing the need for a law library in Lewisburg, James Frazier constructed one on his property. Constructed in 1834, the former Greenbrier County Library Building (No. 76) served as a law library until 1864 when the court ceased operation due to the Civil War. Three years later in 1837, the Greenbrier County Courthouse (No. 52) was constructed on a vacant lot at 912 North Court Street. Designed by John W. Dunn, the present Greenbrier County Courthouse replaced an earlier courthouse that was located on the corner of Washington and Church Streets.<sup>25</sup> Additions to the courthouse were added in 1937 and 1963 and a two-story annex was completed in 2023.

Improvements in infrastructure as well as the establishment of a bustling economy continued to encourage the settlement of Lewisburg. The population increase led to a building boom and the construction of single-family residences and commercial buildings. As a result of the region’s newfound wealth, the architecture of the region began to reflect the more elaborate designs of eastern markets through the work of architects/brick masons John Weir and John W. Dunn. Between 1812 and 1847, John Weir and John Dunn constructed residential, religious, governmental, educational and commercial structures in the Federal and Greek Revival styles of architecture. The following tables highlight the structures credited to John Weir and John W. Dunn.

The majority of the large, two-story brick residences extend outward in each direction from the central business district. Between 1800 and 1865, prominent Lewisburg residents such as attorneys, judges, educators, and businessmen constructed large residences in higher architectural styles on large lots. These residences were concentrated along Jefferson and Washington Streets with a smaller number along Lafayette, Chestnut, Randolph, Court, Courtney, and Walnut Streets. These two-story structures represent a time when architects and builders looked to the past and utilized stronger and more permanent building materials such as brick and stone. The residences are three-to-five bays and have more high-styled architectural details including two-story porticos, Doric columns, cornices, and exterior brick chimneys.

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Greenbrier County contained a diverse population which included white inhabitants, free Black residents, and enslaved people. The number of white residents increased from 4,046 inhabitants in 1800 to 10,500 in 1860. By 1835, the population of Lewisburg reached 750 inhabitants.<sup>26</sup> In Lewisburg white men worked in the trades as blacksmiths, tanneries, carpenters, and brick layers as well as in professional fields as judge, attorneys, doctors, and educators. Greenbrier County's Black population consisted of a mixture of free Black and enslaved people. Slave ownership ranged from less than five to hundreds with the enslaved people working on farms and nearby resorts as well as making bricks.<sup>27</sup> The number of enslaved people in Greenbrier County increased from 297 in 1800 to 1,525 in 1860 while the number of free Blacks ranged from two in 1800 to 186 in 1860. (Table 3). Free Black people were employed as barbers, shoemakers, farmers, and brick masons.

During the Civil War (1861-1865), the white residents of Lewisburg largely supported the Confederacy. At various points during the war, both Confederate and Union troops occupied Lewisburg with the Union primarily retaining control. Both the Union and Confederacy utilized the James River & Kanawha Turnpike to transport soldiers and goods. Buildings including the Old Stone Presbyterian Church, Greenbrier County Library, the John Wesley United Methodist Church, hotels, and offices were used as military hospitals for wounded and sick soldiers.

On the morning of May 23, 1862, a brief battle occurred in Lewisburg when Confederate General Henry Heth launched an attack on Union soldiers. Union soldiers were encamped near the Old Stone Church and present-day campus of the New River Community & Technical College. During the battle, cannonballs occasionally hit residences and buildings including the John Wesley United Methodist Church on Foster Street. Union soldiers forced Confederate soldiers to retreat across the Greenbrier River. At the conclusion of the battle, 204 Confederate soldiers were either killed, wounded, or captured, compared to 90 Union soldiers.<sup>29</sup>

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Approximately 96 unknown Confederate soldiers were later buried in a cross-shaped grave at the Confederate Cemetery which overlooks Lewisburg on the western end of town (No. 257).

Residential development in Lewisburg slowed following the Civil War. Between 1870 and 1896, eighteen of the twenty extant structures constructed were one-story, one-and-a half story or two-story single-family dwellings. These residential structures represented popular architectural styles including Victorian, Queen Anne, Italianate, Colonial Revival and Second Empire. Similar to residences constructed earlier, these two-story, single-family dwellings were constructed on large lots primarily along Washington Street East, Randolph Street West, Jefferson Street N, Lafayette Street, and North Lee Street. Many of the residences are L-shaped and feature one-story, full-width or partial front porches while a smaller number of the residences are cottages. Two-story projecting bays with front gables are common. High-style architectural details include turrets, decorative vergeboard, fish-scale shaped shingles, decorative window sashes, and quoins.

In the mid-1870s, private schools that educated young women and men separately emerged. In 1875, the Virginia General Assembly chartered the Lewisburg Female Institute, a private school and successor of the Lewisburg Academy, to educate young women. Young women were taught Latin, Home Economics, music, and art at the Lewisburg Female Institute. The following year, a new two-story academic building and later a dormitory were constructed on the campus of the Lewisburg Academy on Church Street.<sup>30</sup>

Between 1870 and 1890, young men were educated either by private teachers or at public schools such as the Lewisburg Graded School.<sup>31</sup> Thomas Gilmore opened the Greenbrier Male Academy or Gilmore Academy in 1890 with 90 male students attending. The original school building was located on land near the corner of Washington and Dwyer Streets; however, it was destroyed by fire. Beginning in 1896, young men were educated at private schools located on North Lee Street. The name of the schools changed multiple times before Col. H. B. Moore and his brothers Capt. Joseph Moore and Capt. D. T. Moore established the Greenbrier Military School in 1922.<sup>32</sup> In 1926, the three-story, Collegiate Gothic style school was built at 400 N Lee Street. The Greenbrier Military School continued to educate young men until 1972 when it closed.

While new residential and commercial development was limited following the Civil War, the railroad, coal, and timber industries were emerging in the surrounding area. Lewisburg's commercial center developed with businesses that catered to both residents and visitors. In the book *Hardesty's West Virginia Counties*, Lewisburg's commercial district in 1884 is described as having "six general mercantile establishments, one grocery store, one drug store, one restaurant, one tannery (operated by Withrow), one marble yard, two furniture factories, one hotel, two livery stables, one national bank, one jewelry store, two barber shops, four blacksmith shops, two merchant tailors, six churches (four white, two black), two carriage factories, one

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female institute, one school building, one town hall, one Masonic Lodge, one lodge of Odd Fellows, one Court of Foresters, one chair factory, one post office (money order), one printing office, one millinery establishment, two shoe shops, three mantau (clothing) makers, two harness and saddlery houses, one resident surveyor, five resident physicians, two dentists, seven ministers, and ten attorneys.”<sup>33</sup> The types of businesses including the tannery, furniture, chair, and carriage factories, and clothing and shoe shops represent a time when goods were produced locally by skilled craftsmen rather than mass-produced by machines.

On the morning of August 3, 1897, a fire destroyed thirteen wood structures in the business section of Lewisburg. The fire blazed along Main Street to North Court Street, destroying retail stores, law offices, and the Bank of Greenbrier.<sup>34</sup> Following the fire, property owners began rebuilding the commercial district and the city established its first fire department. Two of the first buildings constructed following the fire were the Greenbrier Valley Bank Building (No. 410) at 930-942 Washington Street West and the old Lewisburg Bank-Elks Building (No. 407) at 931 Washington Street West. The Greenbrier Valley Bank was designed by James M. Lee of the Lee Military Academy in the Colonial Revival style of architecture.<sup>35</sup> These two buildings were soon followed by the David Hammond/Thomas White Law Office (No. 414) at 959-963 Washington Street West and the Yarid Building (No. 411) at 935 Washington Street West in 1899. Over the next twenty years, additional brick commercial structures were constructed along Washington Street.

#### *Twentieth Century: 1900 to 1974*

Residential and commercial development continued through the turn of the twentieth century. The population of Lewisburg increased as a result of the nearby coal, timber, and railroad industries. Even though these industries were not directly in Lewisburg, coal operators such as James B. Laing and other management officials resided and established offices in Lewisburg. Commercial architecture of this era was often designed to express the values and qualities of the businesses within. During the decades of significant industrialization and economic growth, prior to the predominance of radio and television advertising, a company’s building served as an important means of conveying attributes such as prosperity, stability, trustworthiness, security, and innovation.

Lewisburg’s population continued to increase during the early twentieth century resulting in the construction of single-family dwellings. (Table 4) Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps from 1905, 1910, and 1923 show one-story, one-and-a-half story, and two-story residences along Walnut, Green, German, Lafayette, Randolph, and Main Streets. The residences featured in the Sanborn maps are concentrated near the central business district. The majority of the single-family dwellings are of wood frame construction while a smaller number are brick or stone. The shape

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of the residences includes L-shape, T-shape, and rectangular. These residences sit back from the street to varying degrees and have large backyards. Some of the residences have one-and-a-half story wood frame outbuildings at the rear of the lot.

In 1902, Carnegie Hall (No. 32) was constructed on the campus of Lewisburg Female Institute. It replaced a building that had been destroyed by fire the previous year. Steel tycoon Andrew Carnegie contributed \$26,750 and the community raised \$10,000 to fund the construction of this brick building.<sup>36</sup> The architectural firm of Barrett & Thompson designed Carnegie Hall in the Greek Revival style of architecture. Carnegie Hall provided students with classroom space, studios, labs, and an auditorium. It operated until 1972 when it closed and briefly became part of the Greenbrier Center, a facility for special needs individuals. In 1983, a group of citizens formed Carnegie Hall, Inc. to save the historic building from demolition. Carnegie Hall was restored and utilized for performances, art education programming, and gallery space.

A new method of transportation emerged in the early twentieth century. The Lewisburg & Ronceverte Electric Railway, a short-line railroad, was chartered in 1905 to connect Lewisburg and the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad in Ronceverte. Italian immigrants and local residents constructed this 6-mile interurban railway line along a section of present-day US Route 219 ending at a passenger station near the Neely Building at 916 Washington Street West.<sup>37</sup> It was completed in 1907 and transported freight, mail, and passengers. Six years later in 1913, overhead wires were installed, and the locomotives were converted from steam to electricity.<sup>38</sup> The Lewisburg and Ronceverte Electric Railway constructed a train depot on Echols Lane in Lewisburg. In 2016, due to the threat of demolition, the train depot was relocated. The Lewisburg & Ronceverte Electric Railway operated until 1931 when the company closed, and the tracks were removed.

After World War I (1914-1918), a number of commercial buildings, residences, schools, and roads were constructed in Lewisburg. The 1923 United States Geological Survey Topographic map shows a heavily developed commercial district along Washington Street between Church Street and Lafayette Street. These two-story and three-story commercial buildings were

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constructed close together and have rectangular or square plans. The first floor of these commercial buildings features storefronts with large display windows to attract customers.




Figure 2: Excerpt from the 1923 USGS Topographic Map of Lewisburg

As seen in Figure 2, early residential development was also heavily concentrated along Washington, Lee, North Court, and Randolph Streets. A smaller number of residences were situated on other streets in the historic district. Historic USGS topographic maps of Lewisburg show increased development along Church Street by 1935. (Figure 3)

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


Figure 3: Excerpt from the 1935 USGS Topographic Map of Lewisburg.

Between 1921 and 1926, three new school buildings were constructed in Lewisburg: Greenbrier Hall, Greenbrier Military School, and Lewisburg High School. Greenbrier Hall (No. 35) was constructed in 1921 on the campus of Lewisburg Seminary, formerly the Lewisburg Female Institute at 653 Church Street. Architect Stanhope Johnson designed the three-story academic building in the Neo-Classical style of architecture. Another academic building was constructed on the campus of the Greenbrier Military School, a private school for young men, located at 400 North Lee Street. In 1926, a three-story academic building designed in the Collegiate Gothic style was constructed to replace a building that caught fire the previous year.

In 1924, Lewisburg's first public high school that educated white students was built at 232 North Lee Street. Prior to its construction, Lewisburg did not have a public high school. White students traveled to Ronceverte on the L&S Railway to attend high school. However, the 1923 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map of Lewisburg shows a school at this location. In 1924, Lewisburg High School (No. 217) was constructed in the Classical Revival style of architecture. The building

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served as the high school until 1968 when schools were consolidated and students began attending Greenbrier East High School.

Automobiles soon replaced the electric railroad as they became more popular, and roads were improved with hard surfaces. In 1920, the West Virginia Legislature designated 4,600 miles as the state highway system.<sup>39</sup> Two roads in Lewisburg, the Midland Trail, formerly the James River & Kanawha Turnpike and the Seneca Trail, the predecessor of US Route 219, were included in this classification. Both roads were widened and paved with bituminous macadam. Over the next few years, the Midland Trail, which ran along Main or Washington Street in an east-west direction, was designated US Route 60. The Seneca Trail ran in a north-south direction along Jefferson Street and was designated US Route 219. The designation of US Route 60 resulted in sections of this road being realigned including in the western end of the historic district between the North House and former Greenbrier County Library building.

The 1923 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map shows a transition in transportation-related businesses in Lewisburg's central business district. Public and private garages, auto repair shops and car dealerships had replaced wagon shops and carriage facilities. Two car dealerships were constructed on West Washington Street in the 1920s: the Colonial Ford Building (No. 400) at 878 West Washington Street and the Lewisburg Chevrolet Building (No. 403) at 886 West Washington Street. Constructed in 1928, the Colonial Ford Building is two-story brick commercial building while the Chevrolet Building is a one-story brick commercial building. Two gas stations were later constructed in the Lewisburg Historic District at 864 Washington Street W in 1954 (No. 399) and at 1092 Washington Street E in 1970 (No. 325). The gas station at 864 Washington Street W has since been converted into a restaurant while the other continues to operate as a gas station.

When the stock market crashed in October of 1929 and the country entered the Great Depression, development in Lewisburg decreased. President Franklin D. Roosevelt created programs through the New Deal to help unemployed Americans return to work. In 1935, the Works Progress Administration (WPA) was created and focused on infrastructure projects such as building schools, roads, and hospitals. One WPA project in Lewisburg involved constructing additions to the Greenbrier County Courthouse. West Virginia architect A. F. Wysong (1881-1944) designed two-bay extensions to the two-story brick wings.<sup>40</sup> Construction of the additions began in 1937 and employed approximately 82 local workers.<sup>41</sup>

The WPA also erected a new post office (No. 330) at 1129 East Washington Street. In 1937, the Town of Lewisburg purchased land belonging to Hallie M. Sibold and construction began on the one-story brick building.<sup>42</sup> Supervising Architect of the Treasury Department Lewis A. Simon (1867-1958) designed the Lewisburg Post Office in the Colonial Revival style of architecture.

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The interior of the post office features a mural entitled “Old Time Camp Meeting.” Artist Robert Franklin Gates painted this mural that depicts an early traveling preacher delivering an outdoor sermon to settlers.<sup>43</sup>

*World War II to 1974*

While the overall population of Greenbrier County decreased, Lewisburg experienced population growth during the mid-to-late 20<sup>th</sup> century. (Table 5) Lewisburg’s population steadily increased from 1,202 in 1910 to 3,065 in 1980. Following World War II, additional single-family dwellings were constructed on vacant lots along the perimeter of the Lewisburg Historic District. These residences continued to be designed in popular early 20<sup>th</sup> century styles such as Colonial Revival, Cape Cod, Tudor Revival, and Arts and Crafts as well as mid-century styles including Minimal Traditional, Ranch, and Split Levels. The majority of single-family dwellings constructed during this era are smaller in size compared to those erected in the nineteenth century. The residences are linear and frequently have an attached garage.

A small number of commercial buildings were constructed throughout the central business district following World War II. These commercial buildings are concentrated along Randolph, Lafayette, East Washington, Court, and North Jefferson Streets and represent the simple design of this period. The buildings, including the two at 393 and 399 East Randolph Street (No. 270), have a linear plan with minimal architectural details. The majority of these commercial buildings are detached one-story and two-story, brick buildings with large display windows on the first floor. Professional offices, restaurants, a grocery store, and the Greyhound Bus Station occupied the first floor of these buildings.

With increased automobile traffic following World War II, highways were being planned and constructed for higher speeds. The passage of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956 resulted in West Virginia being assigned four interstate highways: I-64, I-70, I-81 and I-77. Construction of I-64, a 173-mile east-west superhighway between Huntington and the WV/VA state line, began in 1957 and was completed in 1988. Interstate 64 was constructed 1.5 miles north of the Lewisburg Historic District. While a small number of residences within the historic district have been converted into use as bed and breakfasts, hotels as well as chain restaurants, automobile-related services, and shopping centers are located outside the historic district. The lack of these modern intrusions assists the Lewisburg Historic District in maintaining its historic character and integrity.

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The newly constructed superhighways resulted in travelers bypassing once thriving downtown business districts. Consequently, discussions began in the 1960s to develop a former industrial site on North Jefferson Street into a tourist destination. A variety of businesses including the Withrow Tannery, Donnally Glove Factory, Lewisburg Steam Roller Flour Mills, and Lewisburg Milling and Electric Company once occupied this site. In 1961, the corporation Old Red Mill planned to convert the Bluegrass Mill Building, a three-story building constructed in 1905 that housed Lewisburg's first electric light plant, into a country store.<sup>44</sup> However, the building was destroyed by fire shortly before opening day, leaving its stone foundation. A log building (No. 155) was soon constructed on its stone foundation, using antique logs salvaged from other buildings in the county. The Old Red Mill group had planned to construct a village and museum; however, their efforts to establish a museum did not materialize. One of the organizers, Rosalie Detch, opened the Fort Savannah Inn, a pioneer-themed motor lodge. Fort Savannah Inn utilized the log building as a restaurant and reception area, and two separate motel buildings were constructed. The motel buildings were razed in 2013.<sup>45</sup> Today, this site is known as Montwell Commons.

In 1972, both private schools, the Greenbrier Military School and Greenbrier College, closed their doors. The 43-acre Greenbrier Military School campus became the Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine. It was founded in 1972 by a group of osteopathic physicians who believed rural West Virginia needed a school to train doctors.<sup>46</sup> The same year, the college acquired the three buildings belonging to the former Greenbrier Military School. The buildings underwent renovation over the next two years and opened in 1974 with 36 medical students. The other private institution, Greenbrier College, became Greenbrier Center, a facility for special needs individuals and later the Greenbrier Campus of the New River Community & Technical College.

Since the 1970s, Lewisburg continues to grow in both population and size. New residential and commercial development between 1974 and 2024 makes up approximately 1.4% of the total number of buildings in the Lewisburg Historic District. The majority of new development is found north of the historic district on each side of Jefferson Street N (Seneca Trail) and within close proximity to I-64. Lewisburg's population was 3,922 inhabitants in 2020.<sup>47</sup> Lewisburg remains a small city with a rich education, cultural, and law tradition as well as governmental center. The city benefits from a thriving tourism industry with a number of retail businesses, restaurants, and bed and breakfasts located in the central business district. Since 1923, the West Virginia State Fair has been held one mile south of Lewisburg in the town of Fairlea, drawing large crowds each August from inside and outside of the state. In 2011, readers of the magazine *Budget Travel* named Lewisburg the "Coolest Small Town" in America.

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### ***Architecture***

The architecture found in the Lewisburg Historic District ranges from the colonial period to the present-day. It also represents the wide spectrum of architectural styles found in West Virginia and the United States. Early residential and commercial buildings were constructed utilizing local materials including wood and limestone while later construction materials included brick, vinyl siding, aluminum siding, and asbestos. The diversity of styles, massing, and sizes highlights Lewisburg's rich architectural history and reflects the changing design influences in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

### **Log**

The earliest log structures in Lewisburg were constructed in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries of native materials. Log cabins were used as dwellings as well as for holding religious services and government meetings. Constructed of native timber, these buildings had notched corner posts and side-gable roofs sheathed in wood shingles. An exterior brick or stone chimney is typically present on one of the gable ends. One extant two-story log structure is "The Barracks" (No. 154, Photo 3) at 934 N Jefferson. Other early log cabins in the district have been covered with weatherboard.

### **I-House**

Residences with a central passage plan were found in large numbers throughout the Lewisburg Historic District. Constructed in the nineteenth century, central passage residences have a rectangular plan and are two rooms wide and one or two rooms deep with a center hallway. The main entrance is usually centered along the front façade. Like the log cabins, central-passage residences were constructed of local material and lacked stylistic embellishments. Identifying characteristics include weatherboard siding, side gable roof, and chimneys on the gable ends or along the roofline.

### **Federal**

Following the Revolutionary War, new and more formal styles of architecture gained popularity in the United States. British architect Robert Adams created the Federal style, also known as the Adams style, after he traveled to Italy to study classical buildings. Information about the Federal style was distributed in architectural plan books that were utilized by carpenters and builders. It was prominent in the United States between the 1780s and 1840s and is often associated with the early US government.

Prominent citizens in Lewisburg hired brick masons and architects John Dunn or John Weir to construct some of the Federal style residences and commercial buildings. These permanent structures were constructed of brick. Residences constructed in the Federal style have a square or rectangular shape and are two rooms or more in depth. Federal style buildings feature strict symmetry and balance often expressed in a five-bay façade with a central entry and double hung

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sash windows in the outer bays. Other characteristics of the Federal style include semi-circular or elliptical fanlights above the front door and cornices with dentils or other decorative moldings.

A number of Federal-style buildings are found in the Lewisburg Historic District. One of the best-known Federal style residences is the John Montgomery House at 1030 Jefferson Street N (No. 144). Other buildings include the McClenachan-Welch House at 137 Chestnut Street (No. 11), James Withrow House & Store (also known as the "Community House"), the Samuel McClung House at 132 McClung Street (No. 252), and the Rev. John Spotts House at 489 Randolph Street E (No. 276).

### **Greek Revival**

During the early to mid-nineteenth century, the Greek Revival style was popular in the United States. This style reflected the idealism associated with the newly established democratic system and its rejection of ties to England following the War of 1812. Americans began looking towards ancient Greece rather than England due to the Greece's role in creating democracy. Builders constructed a variety of public buildings including banks, churches, and government buildings as well as residences in the Greek Revival style. It was a prominent style of architecture between 1830 and 1850 and tends to be associated with wealthy and prominent landowners.

Architectural details mirrored those from Greek temples including porticos with triangular pediments supported by Doric columns. Greek Revival houses could take a front-gabled temple form with full or partial eave returns, or a side-gabled form with a front portico and prominent end chimneys. Other recognizable characteristics include the cornice with or without dentil moldings, wide frieze band and low-pitched gable or hipped roof. Lewisburg has a small number of residences as well as the Greenbrier County Courthouse (No. 52) constructed in this style.

### **Italianate**

The Italianate style first appeared in the United States in the 1830s and 1840s.<sup>48</sup> It gained popularity due to pattern books published by landscape designer Andrew Jackson (A. J.) Downing and others.<sup>49</sup> The Italianate style took its inspiration from rural and country houses and villas in Italy. Pattern books disseminated information about this style to the American people and allowed local builders to use the information to tailor each house to the owner's tastes and pocketbook. At the same time, the invention of the balloon frame in the 1830s allowed the construction of asymmetrical residences. The balloon frame also reduced the cost and increased the speed with which buildings could be constructed.<sup>50</sup>

Italianate residences and commercial buildings are square or rectangular in shape and have low-pitched, hipped roofs. Other defining characteristics include single or paired brackets at the cornice line and tall and narrow windows with hoods. A small number of both residences and

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commercial buildings in Lewisburg were designed in the Italianate style. Examples of the Italianate style include the Alexander Mathews House at 1335 Washington Street E (No. 350), Dennis-Caldwell House at 730 Jefferson Street S (No. 166), and the Wallace and Wallace Funeral House at 884 Jefferson Street N (No. 150)

### **Queen Anne**

During the mid-to-late nineteenth century, the United States experienced rapid industrialization. Americans began moving to urban areas from rural ones to work in factories and other developing industries. Construction materials including the dimensional lumber and ornamental wood elements were mass-produced resulting in inexpensive and readily available products. Railroads, one of the new industries, permitted mass-produced materials and pre-cut architectural details to be shipped over greater distances.

Queen Anne residences first appeared in the United States in the late 1870s. It was popularized by the work of British architect Richard Norman Shaw and his followers.<sup>51</sup> The Queen Anne style has little to no connection with Queen Anne or the formal architecture during her reign (1702-1714); instead, it draws from the Medieval models from the Elizabethan and Jacobean eras that preceded her reign.<sup>52</sup> Residences designed in the Queen Anne style are more elaborate in their architectural details. Common characteristics of the Queen Anne style include an irregular or asymmetrical plan and elevations, wrap around porches, turrets, bay windows and wall texture created by shingles, wood siding, and half-timbering.

### **Commercial Vernacular**

In the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, cities and towns including Lewisburg were rapidly growing. Industrialization, specifically the neighboring coal, timber, and railroad industries contributed to the growth of Lewisburg. Additional commercial buildings in the downtown central business district were needed. In order to accommodate new businesses, structures were constructed with two or three stories and minimal ornamentation. Their organized elevations, consisting of regular bays and stories, descended from classically based styles such as Federal and Greek Revival, but design elements were simplified to serve the functions needed in an economical and practical way. Technological innovations in plate glass production allowed storefronts to be built to display the goods within. Ornamentation, where present, consisted of decorative brickwork integrated into the façade, and applied mass-produced wood and metal cornices.

These buildings were designed for commercial use and had storefronts with large single pane windows on the first floor and offices or residences on the upper floors. The commercial buildings in Lewisburg ranged in height from one to three stories and from a single storefront with one entrance to double storefronts with two or three entrances. A small number of

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commercial buildings have entrances on the corner. The majority of the entrances are recessed, have a transom, and are flanked by single pane windows. Commercial buildings with two to three entrances included one door on the outer bay that provided access to the second floor. Another feature of the commercial buildings were smaller windows on the second and third floor.

Beginning at the turn of the twentieth century, more commercial buildings were constructed of brick. Following the 1897 Lewisburg fire that destroyed a part of the commercial district. The first brick commercial buildings in Lewisburg were constructed on wide lots while those with a date of construction after the 1920s were constructed on narrow lots and have an elongated form.

### **Commercial High Style**

One of the more ornate commercial buildings was constructed of brick following the 1897 fire which destroyed part of the central business district. In 1897, the first commercial building, the Greenbrier Bank (No. 407), was designed in the Romanesque Revival style in Lewisburg and was constructed on the corner of West Washington and North Court Street. The Romanesque Revival style emerged in the late nineteenth century and were primarily used for public and commercial buildings. This style features buildings constructed of masonry, arched windows, belt courses, and a tripartite façade with rusticated base, *piano nobile*, and cornice.

### **Colonial Revival**

In the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the Colonial Revival style of architecture gained popularity in the United States. It was a return to more traditional styles from the colonial period such as Federal and Georgian architecture and away from the Victorian style. The 1893 Columbian Exposition (World's Fair) in Chicago contributed to this trend as architects designed the fair's buildings in historical and classical styles.

Identifying characteristics of the Colonial Revival styles include a pediment supported by slender columns to cover the front porch, an accentuated front door with side lights or fan lights and double hung windows. A number of Colonial Revival residences were constructed in Lewisburg including the Ruth Woods Dayton House at 202 Van Sickler Drive (No. 299) and Blackburn House at 1618 Washington Street E (No. 367).

### **Cape Cod**

The Cape Cod (1925-1955) style developed as a subtype of the Colonial Revival style of architecture with modest one-story cottages modeled after wooden folk houses found in eastern Massachusetts and New York villages.<sup>53</sup> Cape Cod residences are typically symmetrical one-story with side gable roofs, dormers, an exterior chimney, centered main entrance with side

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lights, and multi-paned, double-hung windows. They often resemble and share features with Colonial Revivals. The Cape Cod form continued in popularity through the mid-twentieth century, with increasingly simplified aesthetics, becoming a common form within the movement known as Minimal Traditional: homes taking traditional forms with low or no roof eave overhang and mass-produced materials.

### **Neoclassical Revival**

Another revival style found in Lewisburg is the Neoclassical Revival. It emerged in the first half of the twentieth century. This style was also influenced by the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago where prominent architects designed the fair's buildings in classical styles. Characteristics of this style include symmetry, a full-height portico supported by Ionic or Corinthian columns. Some of Lewisburg's most notable institutional buildings are Neoclassical Revival, including Carnegie Hall (No. 32), Greenbrier Hall (No. 35), and the Old Stone Church Educational Building (No. 33).

### **Four-Square**

Four-Square is not an architectural style but a house form. This form can have design elements and features that identify with the Colonial Revival, Arts and Crafts, Mission, and other styles. It emerged in the early twentieth century and refers to a two-story house with a square floor plan with four rooms on the first floor and four rooms on the second floor. Defining characteristics include a hipped roof, gabled or hipped dormers, one-story, full-width front porch, and centered main entrance with windows on the outer bays. One example of a residence designed in the Four-Square form is the Methodist Church Parsonage at 309 Lee Street N (No. 233).

### **Arts and Crafts Movement**

The Arts and Crafts movement originated in England in the mid-nineteenth century and became popular in the United States in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. In England, it was a reaction to the Industrial Revolution and the mass production of "substandard" products. Art critic John Ruskin wrote about relying on skilled craftsman rather than using machines to manufacture goods. Critics including Ruskin and English Architect William Morris believed mass-produced products lacked artistic merit and should clearly convey its function, structure, and material.

In the early twentieth century, residences designed in the Arts and Crafts style of architecture gained popularity in the United States. It was a reaction to the overcrowded slums found in cities and a nationwide effort to eradicate vice and diseases. The Arts and Crafts movement in the US emphasized handcrafted and quality materials over mass-produced materials and an informal lifestyle. Several Arts and Crafts residences are found in Lewisburg, Key characteristics movement include a low-pitched roof with a wide-eave overhang and brackets, the use of natural materials, and prominent front porches,

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*Craftsman/Bungalow*

Craftsman and bungalows also became a popular style and house type in the United States. Gustav Stickley, author of the magazine *Craftsman*, featured designs for furniture as well as architectural plans for the craftsman lifestyle. He created spacious rooms that highlighted beautiful woodwork and many windows to allow more natural light.

The bungalow was inspired by Charles Sumner Greene and his brother Henry Mather Greene who designed these houses in Pasadena, California.<sup>54</sup> They applied the principles of the Arts and Crafts movement to their own designs. Bungalows gained popularity as it was featured in architectural journals and builder's catalogs such as Sears and Roebuck. Customers across the United States could order pre-cut packages that could be assembled by local contractors.<sup>55</sup> Bungalows were primarily located in suburban environments but a few can be found in rural areas too. Several bungalows are found in Lewisburg including the dwelling at 262 Foster Street (No. 118).

Key characteristics of the Craftsman and bungalows include a side gable roof with large dormer, exposed rafters, recessed front porch with large (tapered) posts, decorative brackets under the eaves, and windows with a multi-pane sash over a single sash.

### **Minimal Traditional**

The Minimal Traditional style emerged in the United States between the mid-1930s and 1950s. This style of small house was constructed with Federal Housing Authority (FHA) loans during the Great Depression and for workers relocating to work at war production plants during World War II. The FHA limited the size of houses and kept sale prices down so buyers had the opportunity to purchase a home.

Key characteristics of the Minimal Traditional style include a one-story, small house, low pitched roof with minimal or no eave overhangs, multi-pane or one-over-one windows, and minimal architectural details. These homes take traditional home forms, particularly Cape Cod and Colonial Revival.

### **Ranch**

Following the Great Depression and World War II, the United States experienced prosperity and a population boom. New construction of residences was limited during these years except for small houses built under FHA financing guidelines.<sup>56</sup> However, the post-war years saw a need for more housing in communities. Returning WWII veterans and other Americans wanted a home to raise their families and a space of their own. At the same time, automobiles were

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becoming the main mode of transportation resulting in one-story, rectangular-shaped houses being built on wider lots rather than on narrow lots near streetcar lines.

The Ranch house became a popular style throughout the United States in the 1950s and 1960s. The style originated in southern California in the mid-1930s and was loosely based on Spanish Colonial and Mexican residences found in the southwest. Similar to other styles, builder and promotor Cliff May introduced the Ranch house to readers of *Sunset Magazine*. This magazine and others also emphasized a more relaxed lifestyle in the post-World War II period.<sup>57</sup>

Ranch style dwellings were often located in large subdivisions. Ranch dwellings emphasized linear lines and garages and car ports added to their width. These residences featured larger public rooms including living rooms and kitchens. Identifying characteristics of the Ranch style include a low-pitched roof, one-story, rectilinear or elongated plans, large picture windows, off-center main entrances, and attached garages.

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**Verbal Boundary Description** (Describe the boundaries of the property.)

The National Register boundary for the Lewisburg Historic District follows the parcel lines closest to the original boundaries from the 1978 nomination document. This includes, on the west, Parcel 10-19-158; on the south, parcels along Church Street, Court Street, Austin Street, Bell Drive, Lafayette Street, and Lightner Avenue; on the east, parcels along Washington Street East, Edgar Drive, Dwyer Lane, Matthews Street; and on the north, parcels along Lee Street, Greenbrier Avenue, Court Street N, Green Lane, Walnut Street, Randolph Street W, and Courtney Drive; and parcels on all intervening streets within this perimeter.

**Boundary Justification** (Explain why the boundaries were selected.)

The recommended boundary for the Lewisburg Historic District clarifies the original 1978 boundary. The UTM points and sketch map boundaries from the original nomination were mapped in GIS. Using these lines as a guide, preparers traced the nearest parcel lines. Parcels along the perimeter with uncertain status were reviewed for date of construction and integrity. If the property would qualify as a contributing resource, it was included and if it was post-1974 or non-contributing, it was excluded.


