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PREFACE

The Albert N. West Architectural Historic Resource Survey, located in Gilmer County, West Virginia, is the initial effort of the Gilmer County Historic Landmarks Commission's (HLC) commitment to identify and document the architectural and historical resources of local architect Albert N. West. The purpose of this Historic Resource Survey is to investigate the architectural achievements as a whole, identify patterns of historic development, review what resources still exist, and provide a framework for further in-depth research of specific sites. Also, the Survey Report includes written recommendations with appropriate documentation about any properties in the survey area qualifying for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places, nomination for National Register Historic District, or a thematic National Register nomination. The report and the survey will be used to guide the Commission on where to concentrate efforts in future surveys and nominations.

The majority of the sites in the project area are in the town of Glenville, West Virginia. Additional sites are located in Cedarville, Normantown, Stumptown, and Rosedale, West Virginia. Two additional sites on Russett Road, County Rt. 7, just over the county line in Calhoun County have been included to enhance the cohesiveness of the project. In conducting the survey, the consultant extensively reviewed the history of Albert N. West and his family's economic and social impact on the surrounding region to determine significant periods and themes of development. The concentration in this survey is the town of Glenville with additional sites located in Sand Fork, Normantown, Stumptown, and Rosedale, as illustrated on the accompanying maps.

The survey includes a review of West related sites within the boundaries of Gilmer County, West Virginia, in addition to two sites in Calhoun County. The review indicates whether the site is an eligible, non-eligible, or modern resource, and is depicted on enclosed maps. The project involves a detailed survey and inventory of all the sites, numbering 1 – 30, within the town of Glenville and the previously mentioned surrounding areas. The actual method of identification involves on-site field review of the sites known to be Albert West's, as identified from copies of original drawings. Other sites have been identified after interviewing local residents and reading related materials. All sites identified within the survey date prior to 1955. These have then been reviewed against the history of Gilmer County and the surrounding area to record which sites contain historic or architectural significance. West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms are completed for all pre-1955 sites and interviews with owners or the volunteers conducted on a number of sites. The sites are mapped on a topographic map and given an identifying number for ease of locating. The sites are then reviewed within a theme approach in relation to Albert N. West and recommendations on their possible significance and further research requirements are made.

The survey of Albert N. West is by no means complete and periodic updating and surveying is, of course, necessary. Additional sites in other areas will also require surveying and other sites related to his father J. W. West could be included at this time.

This report is intended as a means of reviewing the survey project and making informed decisions on where to concentrate efforts in the future. Recommendations are made concerning continued research and potential landmark sites. The report is organized in a manner that will be useful for its reference use.

The **Preface** is first as a means of describing the project and familiarizing the reader with the process; this is followed by the **Purpose, Methodology** and the **History**. A **Description of the Survey Area** follows the historical summary and then a detailed **List of Sites** describes each resource. A **Photograph Log** and a **UTM Reference List** are included after the **List of Sites** for further identification. The **Analysis and Recommendations** section follows, and it is here that recommendations for additional work and examination of the resources identified are presented.

A grant from the **West Virginia Division of Culture and History, State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO)**, was awarded in the Fall of 2000 to the Gilmer County HLC for the Albert N. West Architectural Survey, Gilmer County, West Virginia. The HLC and the consultant agreed upon initial boundaries for the survey. The area surveyed was to encompass twenty five (25) individual structures in addition to any and all outbuildings associated with each structure. The consultant, wanted to include more of the related sites discovered in the area, so the total count of individual sites was increased to 30.

The survey area encompasses the towns of Glenville, Sand Fork, Cedarville, Normantown, Stumptown, Rosedale, and two sites in Calhoun County.

The survey records thirty (30) individual sites related to Albert N. West. Thirty (30) West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms have been prepared.

The survey sites are transcribed to a map for field-work and initial field notes are prepared. This information is discussed with the HLC, for confirmation of the methodology adopted. This information from the field notes, research and volunteer input is included on the West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms. The field maps are revised at this point to illustrate the survey work and the analysis and findings. The maps also include the site number and coding of eligible and non-eligible sites.

The consultant wishes to acknowledge the willing cooperation he received from the Gilmer County HLC and the helpful volunteer work provided through Jim Bailey. Additional information and cooperation from Normantown resident Ron Miller also aided in the study. Property owners throughout the survey area have been friendly, helpful and knowledgeable about their homes and the area's history.

A special thanks is due to Albert West's son Karl W. West of Oak Ridge, Tennessee, for his cooperation with the Gilmer County HLC and the survey team. Through personal interviews and telephone interviews, much additional information about Albert N. West was acquired to substantiate the information in this report. Karl West has also donated all of his father's existing, original drawings and the original certificate to practice

architecture, issued to Albert on February 15, 1922, by the Board of Architects, to the Robert Kidd Library at Glenville State College. The donation also includes the following books from Albert N. West's personal library:

PURPOSE

The purpose of the survey is to inventory up to 25 sites within the designated area in Gilmer County, West Virginia. To insure inclusion of the additional sites discovered during the survey, the consultant increased the count to 30 sites. This historic resource survey is an investigation to identify patterns of historic development, review what resources still exist, and provide a framework for further in-depth research of specific sites.

The Historic Landmarks Commission wishes to identify the resources in the area and include them in the HLC's, the City's, and the County's planning procedures. An understanding of the amount, concentration and quality of resources is needed for this purpose. This project is intended to identify and preliminarily quantify sites in Gilmer County and assist in making decisions for future activities, including National Register of Historic Places nominations for individual sites or Historic Districts.

It is anticipated that the survey will uncover a concentration of late 19th and early 20th century historic resources. These resources will be associated with the life and career of Albert N. West. The concentration is expected to be varied.

This report is not considered the final activity in the identification of the architectural work of Albert N. West. As discussed previously, it is the first step in developing a process for decision making and activities for the protection and recognition of the architectural and building skills of West. Further inventory work, in-depth research, and other actions might be necessary.

METHODOLOGY

The first step in the process is to gather and review archival and other research on the history and development of Gilmer County in general and the life of Albert N. West in particular.

Base maps for the survey are prepared using USGS topographic maps enlarged to an appropriate scale. The topographic map has been field checked in 1965 and photo inspected in 1976. The topographic area base map of the survey has been installed in a computer for field work and report use.

The entire survey area is initially walked with the HLC representative, and a field log of all properties identified as, or observed to be, pre-1955, compiled. Each resource is assigned a field number, a brief description of the property, and any outbuildings are included in the list. The modern structures, post 1955, are not included in the count. This log serves as the basis for documenting these sites on West Virginia Historic Properties Inventory Forms. Also included is an initial determination if the property contains historical or architectural qualities warranting listing on the National Register of Historic Places, either individually or as eligible to an eligible Historic District. In all, 30 resources have been logged in. Of these 30 resources, 30 are considered eligible buildings to an eligible Historic District.

Following these phases, the consultant prepares maps for field-work. With the maps and the field notes, the consultant again walks the survey area. For properties previously identified, or in the opinion of the surveyor, related to Albert N. West, a photograph is taken, black and white, and information confirmed on the description, architectural style, modifications, etc. for documentation on inventory forms. Numbers are added to the map, corresponding to the field notes. Properties that have lost integrity through modifications or additions are noted as non-eligible, but are still documented on the West Virginia Historic Property Inventory forms.

For analysis and recommendation purposes, two classifications have been decided upon: *non-eligible* refers to a modern, post 1955 building or to a building that, altered through modification or deterioration, has damaged integrity. *Eligible* refers to a contributing site in a thematic National Register Nomination.

Current owners' information and historical information for the inventory forms is prepared from research provided by Jim Bailey and the Gilmer County HLC and from additional research done by the survey team.

The field and research information is transferred to the West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms and they are prepared for final typing. Thirty (30) West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms have been completed for the Albert N. West Architectural Resource Survey.

At this point, the survey team also evaluates the resources to determine their significance. Evaluation is conducted following the National Register of Historic Places criteria for evaluation and the classifications noted earlier are used in the analysis section of this report.

Site numbers are recorded on the USGS topographic map and this numbering system is consistent for the report, inventory forms and mapping. The USGS map is included under separate cover with this report. An individual UTM reference for each site is noted on the inventory form and in the UTM reference log in this report.

The report has been compiled to provide a reference and analysis of the survey activities and to provide direction for future activities by the Gilmer County Historical Landmarks Commission.

OUTLINE HISTORY OF THE LIFE OF ALBERT N. WEST GILMER COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA

The following is an outline history of the life of Albert Newton West, a Gilmer County architect and builder. The influence of his father, John W. West, was instrumental in the direction of Albert's career, therefore, facts regarding his life and career are also included for continuity. This is not intended to be an exhaustive history of the West lineage, rather a look at how a man living in a small, secluded locale such as Gilmer County made a large contribution to the history of his community. The primary source for this history was Albert West's son, Karl W. West, of Oak Ridge, Tennessee. Through the generous donation of his father's original drawings, we were able to obtain copies of the plans for the majority of the houses cited in this report.

Albert Newton West was the second son of John Wellington West. John W. West was born May 11, 1850, on Duck Creek near West Milford, Harrison County. John's parents were also born on Duck Creek and were descendants from Sir Thomas West, Lord Delaware, who helped establish and maintain the colony at Jamestown, Virginia. At an early age, John W. learned the carpentry trade with his older brother and in 1873 moved with his parents and family to Stone Lick Run in Gilmer County. Being a skilled carpenter by this time, John built the new family home from logs harvested on the property. The log house is still extant.

Soon after settling in their new home, John's mother joined the Baptist Church in Auburn, Ritchie County. Attending church functions with his mother, John met Elizabeth Woofter, daughter of the Rev. John Woofter then pastor of the Leading Creek Baptist Church at Alice in Gilmer County. John West and Elizabeth Woofter were married in Gilmer County in 1876 and moved to Stone Lick Run in Cox's Mills where their first son, Wade Clarence, was born. Shortly after the birth of their son, they moved to Stony, Texas in Denton County to join Elizabeth's brother and work in the "oil" country.

On Easter Sunday, March 28, 1880, in Stony, Texas, John and Elizabeth's second son was born, Albert Newton West. Five years later, after the birth of the third child, a girl they named Neva, the Wests returned to West Virginia and settled in the community of Rosedale where Albert and his three brothers and two sisters grew up. Albert's parents transferred their memberships to Rosedale Baptist Church from Leading Creek Baptist Church and as deacon of this church J. W. West supervised the planning and participated in the building of the church building which was finished in 1875 and dedicated in 1902, site #0029.

It was in Rosedale, where John W. West worked as a carpenter during the prosperity of the gas and oil boom in Gilmer County, that Albert became interested in the trade and began to learn the basic skills. The Mary Bowe House, site #0025, is believed to have been constructed by J. W. West in 1894, and a neighboring house was built in 1900 by J.

W. West, site #0026. Both of these houses are located just across the line in Calhoun County, in close proximity to the community of Rosedale. It is believed that Albert traveled to these job sites with his father learning the skills that would later shape his life. The Sears House, site #0024, is slightly farther north on Route 33 in Stumptown. J. W. West also built this house, ca. 1905, probably with the help of his son Albert who would have been twenty-five at this time.

Albert served as a private in the U.S. Army during the Spanish American War in 1898. The family moved from Rosedale to Glenville in 1903 into a residence in Brooklyn Addition designed and built by the newly founded J.W. West and Sons Construction Company. The West home was built on a lot purchased by Albert and his brother, Clarence in 1902 for \$450, site #0012. The West home became the headquarters for the newly formed construction company and the "drafting room" for Albert's designs. Albert, his younger brothers, Rolla and Lyel and their father J. W. West made up the company. Older brother, Clarence, having finished school at Glenville Normal went on to Brown University, graduated as a Civil Engineer and went to the Philippine Islands for a 10-year employment with the Bureau of Public Works. J. W. West & Sons were recognized during this time period for their skills and excellent work during an era when most building, from the foundation to the roof, was done by hand. During this time they built residences, buildings, churches, schools and bridges in Glenville and the surrounding area.

To provide the building materials they needed, in addition to lumber, they quarried sandstone and produced brick along the south side of the Little Kanawha River at Glenville, sometimes working with the Whitings, who were stone masons and bricklayers. Brick came from the Whiting and West Brick Kiln at the mouth of Nutter Run on the south side of the river at Glenville. They quarried stone at the Whiting and West Quarry located on the same side of the river at the west end of Glenville, and later quarried on Albert's land in south Glenville near where the athletic field exists today. Additional structures built during this early formation of J. W. West & Sons, from 1900 - 1920 include: Site #0003, Fred M. Whiting House, ca. 1904; Site #0006, John E. Arbuckle House, ca. 1905; Site #0007, I.N. Hardman House, ca. 1906; Site #0008, the retaining wall in front of the Administration building at Glenville State College, ca. 1906; Site #30, the addition to the Administration Building at Glenville State College, 1910; Site #0010, Albert N. West House, ca. 1913; and Site #0019, Poor Farm Infirmary, 1907.

On November 5, 1913, Albert married Dosha L. Rymer and moved into their newly designed and built home not far from the J. W. West home on the site where the athletic field is located today. In 1924, this home, site #0010, was moved to its present location diagonally across the street from the original West homeplace. Albert and Dosha's new home was among the first in the area to have hot and cold running water and a complete working bathroom on the second floor. The couple had four children during their marriage and raised all four in this house. During this period, Albert successfully completed a correspondence course in Architecture and Engineering and earned his degree from the International Correspondence School in Scranton, PA, known for its superior architectural program. This school is still in existence today.

On December 27, 1921, Albert filed an application with the Board of Architects of West Virginia for his license to practice in the state. Albert took the written exam and appeared before the board to present his plans and specifications. Two of the buildings in his presentation were under construction, the Sand Fork High School, site #0021, and the Gilmer County Jail and Office Building, site #0005. The third project in his presentation was site #0003, the Fred M. Whiting House built in 1904. Albert also presented a signed letter stating that he had been employed in design capacity for 10 years with J. W. West & Sons Construction Company which made him eligible to be grandfathered in after passing the written exam and making his design presentations. On February 15, 1922, Albert was issued his Architect's License, No. 64, indicating that his license was the 64th in the state to be issued. Albert's brother Rolla also obtained his license at this time, his number being #63. Albert and his brother were the only registered architects in Gilmer County for many years. When Rolla moved out of state, Albert was the only registered architect in Gilmer County in 1951, 1953 and 1957.

Albert set up shop in his home using the attic closet for a dark room, a tracing and photopaper holding frame with a glass front for sunlight exposure, a bathtub of print developer solution, and upstairs hallway clothes drying lines for print hanging and drying.

Albert's brothers Rolla and Lyel joined the U.S. Army Air Force during World War I leaving Albert and 67 year old J. W. West to run the business. To supply the necessary on-site building materials, the J. W. West & Sons Company had ventured into the wood detailing, planing and shaping, mill business in Glenville as well as brick making at the mouth of Nutter's Run and stone quarrying on Albert's property just above the athletic field. A hardwood saw mill and dry kiln at the mouth of Sycamore Run was a necessary part of the overall operation.

During the years 1922 - 1923, Albert designed and built a new home for his mother and father directly across the street from his home and adjacent to the original dwelling. The new home was designed especially to tend to the couple's aging and their illnesses by having a restroom on both floors and a bathtub with a sunken well for foot soaking. Albert's parents lived in this home until their deaths with Albert furnishing most of the financial support. Other houses built during the early 1900's in the area were the: B.W. Craddock House, site #0004, ca. 1925; L. D. Zinn House, site #0009, ca. 1925; N.E. Rymer House, site #0013, ca. 1915; Captain D.U. O'Brien House, site #0014, ca. 1910; R.L. Jarvis House, site #0015, ca. 1915; Earl Arbuckle House, site #0018, ca. 1925; Tanner High School, site #0022, 1929/1933; Normantown School, site #0023, ca. 1928; Cedarville High School, site #0027, 1923; and Log Gas Station, site #0028, ca. 1926. Albert designed and built the Log Gas Station, site #0028, with the help of his wife's two brothers Newt and Ivan Rymer. They acquired the logs from a nearby farm building and moved them to the corner lot in Glenville. The building became a gas station and restaurant in Glenville where it stood for more than 50 years at the corner of U.S. Routes 33 and 119 and State Route 5. In 1982, it was moved to the Cedar Creek State Park and restored to become camp site offices. It remains in this location today.

During the late 1920's, Albert became involved in the highway design business and bridge construction in the area. He designed the road from Glenville to Normantown (now US 119) and also the road from Glenville to Sand Fork to Burnsville, WV Route 5 along the Little Kanawha River. This new road contained two new bridges designed by and fabricated under the supervision of West. The first was an overhead truss bridge with concrete flooring at Sand Fork, built in 1927, and a steel girder with concrete elevated and curved deck bridge at Burnsville built at approximately the same time. Both of these bridges were the first of their kind, and the bridge at Burnsville is still extant.

Also during the late 1920's, Albert joined with a friend, Cecil Davis, in the building moving business. Large poplar timbers, blocks and skids were used to move large homes with two chimneys and several porches. Many of these timbers were 10" x 12" x 30' in length acquired from the dismantling of the old one-lane covered bridges in central West Virginia. Both manually operated screw and ratchet jacks were the primary "lifters", while cables and manually operated winches were the horizontal power movers. The building was supported on skids and hundreds of 3" X 4' pipe rollers during the lifting and winching process. The Currence B. Conrad House, site #0001, is believed to be an example of a house moved by West and Davis. Originally, the house was located on the corner of Main and Morris Streets and was later moved back one lot on Morris to its present day location. Albert West's own home, site #0010, was moved from its original location where the athletic field is now located to its present day location at 111 Park Street. A Baptist church in Troy was moved from one side of the highway to the other by hoisting it 15 to 20 feet in the air over the road and depositing it on the other side with no interference to the traffic on the road. The church remains in that location today. In Glenville, Albert and Cecil did some major alterations to the Glenville Baptist Church. They sawed the church completely in half, extended the length sufficiently for the addition of a baptistery and stage behind the pulpit, and raised it in the air to permit a full basement to be built under the structure. Albert and Cecil also contracted a job with the local funeral home to pick it up and turn it a quarter of a turn for easier access to the building from the alley.

In the early 1930's, Albert became a fulltime employee of the West Virginia State Road Commission. During his career with the State Road Commission, material and money shortages from the State inspired Albert to fabricate many of the tools to handle bridge girders, trusses, and the associated framework. Most of the derricks assembled from gin poles to handle quarry stone, A frames, wire rope winches, and block and tackle were fabricated and stored in a knocked down condition in and around Albert's barn and outbuildings ready for use at any time. Albert worked for the State Road Commission past the required retirement age of 65 years and during the next ten years, he graduated to bridge engineer for the West Virginia State Road Commission 7th District with headquarters in Weston, WV. His oldest son, Homer Paul, was appointed District Engineer at this time becoming his father's boss before he became Maintenance Engineer for the SRC in Charleston.

When Albert wasn't building houses or designing buildings, highways and bridges, he tried his hand at inventing. In his later years, he designed and totally fabricated the first soft top, collapsible, mobile camping trailer in central West Virginia. The unit had two wire spring double beds with mattress, lots of storage space, with a head-room of about six feet at the ridge row, a lockable entrance door, and window screens throughout. According to Albert's diary, "Stanley and Karl helped put the cover on the trailer" on May 20, 1938. Also, during his employment with the State Road Commission, Albert initiated a patent search for a yet unheard of self-powered front-end loader for a tractor.

Albert N. West passed away on May 14, 1961, at St. Mary's Hospital in Clarksburg, WV. During his 81 years, Albert's career in architecture and his involvement in the construction of his designs made a major impact on Glenville and the surrounding communities.

DESCRIPTION OF THE SURVEY AREA

The area surveyed encompasses specific sites from Rosedale north on Rt. 33 to Glenville and east on Rt. 5 to Sand Fork. Additionally, two sites in Calhoun County have been included because of their close proximity to the survey area. The largest concentration of sites lies in the town of Glenville itself with 19 sites recorded there.

The westernmost boundary of the survey area is the Tanner High School, site #0022; the northeast boundary is site #0021, the Sand Fork Elementary School, and the southern boundary is delineated by site #0029, the Rosedale Church. This comprises the area for the Albert N. West Architectural Survey, Gilmer County, West Virginia.

Rolling hills create the terrain with access to the Little Kanawha River within the survey area. During Albert West's lifetime, the river access helped facilitate the transportation of goods for the remote communities in this area as well as provision of transportation for the logs from local timber operations, mining supplies and the coal itself. The oil and gas companies owed their very existence to this river and the men that worked on it.

It was expected that the resources related to Albert N. West would contain primarily late 19th and early 20th century commercial, residential, and educational resources. This was found to be true with very few modified buildings.

The recorded resources fall within the early 19th to mid 20th Century time period and represent the chronological development of the architectural career of Albert N. West. The buildings are primarily one and two-story, wood frame and masonry buildings. The dominance of wood frame structures is a result of the availability of resources in this remote area. Timber was abundant and many mills existed locally. The Wests cut and planed their own wood for building materials as well as quarried local stone and eventually fired their own bricks for building. Before roads came to Gilmer County, the Little Kanawha River was the only transportation for incoming goods. During dry times, the rafts and boats would have to dock and wait for rain in order to navigate the shoals. To avoid delays, the Wests became adept at every aspect of planning and construction, including making their own building supplies.

The Albert N. West Architectural Survey begins on Main Street in the town of Glenville. Site #0001 - #0018 and site #30 are located within the Glenville city limits and all but three of these sites are documented as Albert West designed houses through copies of the original design drawings or written documentation of their existence. The Currence B. Conrad House, site #0001 is believed to be associated with Mr. West during the period in his career when he was working with Cecil Davis moving buildings. This house was originally built on the corner of Main and Morris Streets and later moved to its present location at 7 Morris Street. The Earl Arbuckle House, site #0018, 215 North Court Street, is located between two Albert N. West designed homes and contains many similar characteristics of the flanking houses. The survey then traveled east on Route 5 to include The Old Fair Grounds, site #0020, and, the Sand Fork Elementary School, site

#0021. Copies of the original drawings document these two sites as Albert N. West designs. Leaving Glenville and traveling south on Route 33, the survey encountered Normantown Elementary School, site #0023, Cedarville High School, site #0027, and Camp Site Office in Cedar Creek State Park, site #0028. These three sites are also documented as West designs. See Appendices in this report.

An example of the American Movement Style is the Four Square illustrated by the B. W. Craddock house, site #0004 (305 East Main St.). This two-story, brick residence was designed by Albert West and built by the J. W. West Construction Company. There are two exposed, brick chimneys on the side elevations and a central, interior chimney. The second floor has a central recessed balcony with recessed double entrance doors within an arched opening. There are paired 6/1 windows on the second floor, front elevation, with stained glass windows on the side elevation with a flower motif. The entrance door is flanked by divided sidelights and undivided transom. The porch has large, square brick posts with an enclosed solid brick balustrade. Another example of the Four Square Style in the survey is the Gilmer County Jail and Office Building, site #0005 (8 Howard St.)



An illustration of the Colonial Revival Style is site the N.E. Rymer House, site #0013 (209 Hunter Street),. This two-story, front facing "L" house has a metal roof with a dormer in front having a deep partial return cornice and a 1/1 window. There is a three-story, projecting bay on the left front of the house. The third floor consists of a closed pediment containing a Palladian window. The second floor of this projection contains a single 1/1 window with a simple surround. The first floor projection

has a three-sided bay connecting to the front entrance portico. The main cornice of the house is heavily dentiled. The secondary cornice is also dentiled. The house has German siding and 1/1 windows with simple surrounds. There is a small entrance portico with a closed pediment with heavy dentiling and brackets. The porch has simple Doric columns. Like most of Albert West's creations, the foundation is cut stone with grapevine joints. Another example of the Colonial Revival Style is the Jarvis House, site #0015 (302 South Lewis Street),.

The Prairie Style is represented in the survey by site the J. W. West house, site #0011 (112 Park Street). Albert built this house for his parents to replace the home place next door. It is a two-story, hip roof house with an interior, brick chimney. Windows are 6/6. The façade is wood stained, clapboard siding. Albert built this house to accommodate his aging parent's needs, ca. 1922.

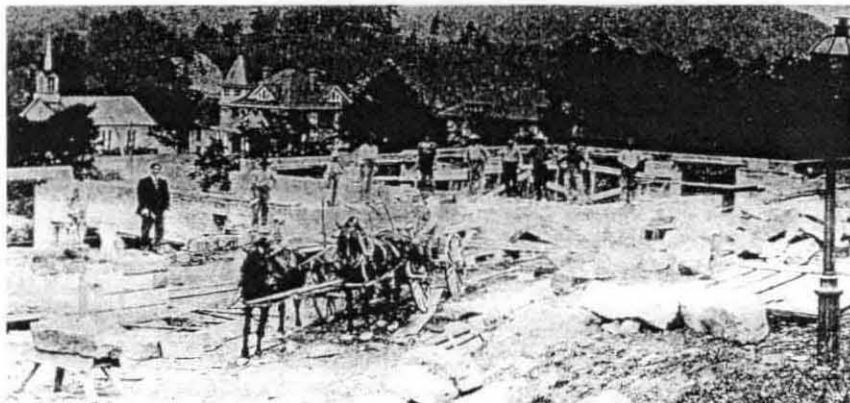


The Queen Anne Style is also present in the designs of Albert West. The John E. Arbuckle House, site #0006, built ca. 1905, is an intact and representative example of a turn-of-the-century Queen Anne Style house. The façade is symmetrical with the exception of the octagonal tower on the corner of the southeast side. The tower has a high pitched roof with an original weathervane at its peak. Characteristic Queen Anne wooden shingles cover the tower at the attic level. The tower windows and all of

the other windows in the house have smooth stone sills and lintels. The entrance bay is located in the center of the façade. The opening is an oak-framed single pane glass door with flanking sidelights and a transom. On the second level, above the entrance, is a round arch space with a door opening onto the porch roof. Adjacent to this is another arched window opening. On the opposite side of the façade from the tower is a two-story, segmented bay. In the façade's roof stands a gabled dormer that intersects with the main hipped roof. The dormer contains a Palladian window and fish-scale shingles. The porch on the façade is one of the house's most notable features. It extends from the tower and wraps around to the northeast façade. Ionic columns support the porch roof and they stand in groups of three in front of the house's main entrance. The foundation is cut stone with grapevine joints. This house is currently listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Another example of the Queen Anne Style in the survey is the Sears House, site #0024, , located in Stumptown.



Also located in this residential section of Glenville is the stone retaining wall in front of the Administration Building on the Glenville College campus. This stone wall, designed by Albert and built by J. W. West & Sons is the typical cut stone with grapevine joints prevalent in most of the West construction. This locally quarried stone is used in most of the foundations of the houses in this survey. Also in the same area is the addition to the Administration Building on the campus of Glenville State College. The historic photograph below shows Lyel West driving a team for John W. West & Sons Construction Company during the construction of this building.



From the residential section of Glenville, the survey moves east on Route 5 to the original site of the Gilmer County Fair Grounds, site #0020. Albert West designed the layout of the fairgrounds and the construction of the bleachers. Northeast of this site off of Route 5 on Sand Fork Road is the Sand Fork Elementary School, site #0021. Albert designed this building and it was constructed in 1921 by J. W. West Construction Co. This building was the first school of several built in the same time period with the Albert West design. Tanner High School, site #0022, west of Glenville on Route 5, Cedarville High School, site #0027, south on Route 33 in Cedarville, and Normantown High School, site #0023, south on Route 33 in Normantown are all examples of the distinct West design used in building schools during the early 1900's.

As was previously stated, the predominant use of the resources is residential, commercial, and educational. The majority of the buildings inventoried fall into the early 20th Century time period. There is evidence of Four Square Style, Bungalow Style, Gothic Revival Style, Colonial Revival Style, Romanesque Revival Style, and Vernacular Style. A complete list of sites follows.

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ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The initial intent of the project is to search out and identify twenty-five buildings known or documented as designed and/or built by Albert N. West, Gilmer County Architect. The potential for National Register eligibility for individual sites or historic districts is also to be investigated. In analyzing the results of the survey, the Criteria of Significance of the National Register of Historic Places has been used.

The resources studied under this survey are generally residential, commercial, educational in nature. As anticipated, there are a low number of non-eligible sites due to modifications. Most of the sites surveyed will be eligible to a Thematic National Register Nomination and all will relate to the life of Albert N. West and the development of his career.

There are 56 individual resources surveyed in this project, including primary and secondary resources. Forty-two (42) were identified as pre-1955 and recorded on West Virginia Historic Property Inventory Forms. Thirty (30) primary, West related sites were surveyed and thirty (30) Inventory Forms were completed. There were twelve (12) secondary resources, outbuildings, etc., recorded as pre-1955 and eligible, and the fourteen (14) remaining secondary resources were recorded as modern, post 1955.

The majority of sites surveyed in this report are documented Albert West designs. Copies of the original designs were provided by Albert's son Karl West of Oak Ridge, Tennessee (see Appendices).

The sites in this survey that are not documented as Albert N. West designs have been included because they are associated with Albert's father, J. W. West, during the time when Albert would have been old enough to have been learning the construction business from his father. Some are included as evidence of some other aspect of Albert's career in the building business. The survey team would recommend the following:

There appears to be enough of a concentration of historic resources to recommend an intensive Historic Resources Survey for the south residential section of Glenville known as the Brooklyn Addition. Although some of the houses have lost historic integrity due to modifications, it is believed that a survey will reveal enough eligible resources to recommend a Historic District in this area. The Brooklyn Addition would be significant under Criterion C for the representative architecture of the community in the early 20th Century. The Bungalow Style is represented in this area as well as the Four Square Style, both representative of the 1900 - 1940 time period. The Albert West house, site #10, would be significant under Criterion B as well for its association with the architect.

In addition, there are some resources that are not particularly representative of major historical or architectural themes, but would normally be considered contributing

structures in a historic district. These are generally the Vernacular Style residences and contribute overall to the atmosphere of the neighborhood. They contribute to the aggregate interpretation of the area as a community. It would be unfortunate to lose these resources to development and a means of protecting the overall interrelationship of these resources is important.

The survey team also recommends a Thematic National Register Nomination for all of the properties identified in this survey related to Albert N. West. Some of the sites in this survey have lost integrity due to modifications and will not be eligible for the National Register but will be included in the Thematic National Register Nomination for their relationship to the local architect, Albert N. West.

The team also found evidence of other resources associated with Albert N. West and his father, J.W. West in surrounding areas. It is recommended that the Gilmer County HLC pursue these leads in the future to determine their association with the Wests as well any further resources discovered within the county and outlying areas.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

In addition to the further investigation of West resources, the survey team recommends that the Gilmer County HLC consider an intensive historic resource survey of the town of Glenville itself. This can be done in phases with the central, downtown area being one phase and the surrounding residential areas being divided up into additional phases. After the surveys are complete, the possibility of a historic district or districts could be investigated for the areas surveyed.

Some form of design review process for historic or significant resources or districts is worth investigating. Once significant resources are identified, it is incumbent upon the identifying party to protect and promote these resources. One of the major tools available for this is design review. West Virginia State Enabling Legislation allows Historic Landmarks Commissions to carry out design reviews of properties they have listed. Legislation also allows controls to be incorporated into city zoning ordinances. This protects the overall ambiance of the area and assists property owners in proper maintenance and rehabilitation of older and historic properties. It is a developmental tool and should not be viewed as a "hindrance" or "detriment" to personal property rights. There have been numerous reports and studies of the positive effects of historic districting and review boards on property values.

The Historic Landmarks Commission should continue its work on identifying and registering historic sites and areas in Gilmer County. Other areas of the county should be surveyed as time and funds allow. Some suggested areas include:

- Intensive historic resource survey of the town of Glenville
- Intensive, phased historic resource survey of the surrounding residential areas
- Intensive historic resource survey of surrounding rural areas.
- Further investigation and identification of West related resources within the county and surrounding areas.

Also, the West Virginia Main Street Program is developing the Hometown Program for small towns in the state. This program could be beneficial for the downtown area of Glenville. The program, offered by the West Virginia Development Office, encourages economic development within the context of historic preservation. The approach through this program relies on community self-reliance and the re-building of Main Street based on its traditional assets; personal service, local ownership, unique architecture, and a sense of community. In addition, this program promotes traditional central business districts emphasizing four components which should be integrated to create a positive, identifiable image for downtown. They are: Organization, Promotion, Design, and Economic Restructuring.

In this initial Albert N. West survey, the main area of concentration is on resources designed and built by Albert with a few included that were built by his father J. W. West during Albert's formative years. It would be important to identify all resources in the

area that are related to J. W. West and the J. W. West and Sons Construction Company. Sites in this survey will include a few resources built by J. W. West during his career as they relate to Albert's education in the building trade and, later, all resources built by the West family under the name of J. W. West & Sons Construction Company. In this survey, all of the resources are found to warrant preservation and promotion. Future work will, undoubtedly, reveal additional resources. The Gilmer County Historic Landmarks Commission has been instrumental in taking the steps necessary to promote the understanding and protection of the historic resources of the county. They should be commended for their foresight and commitment to this work.

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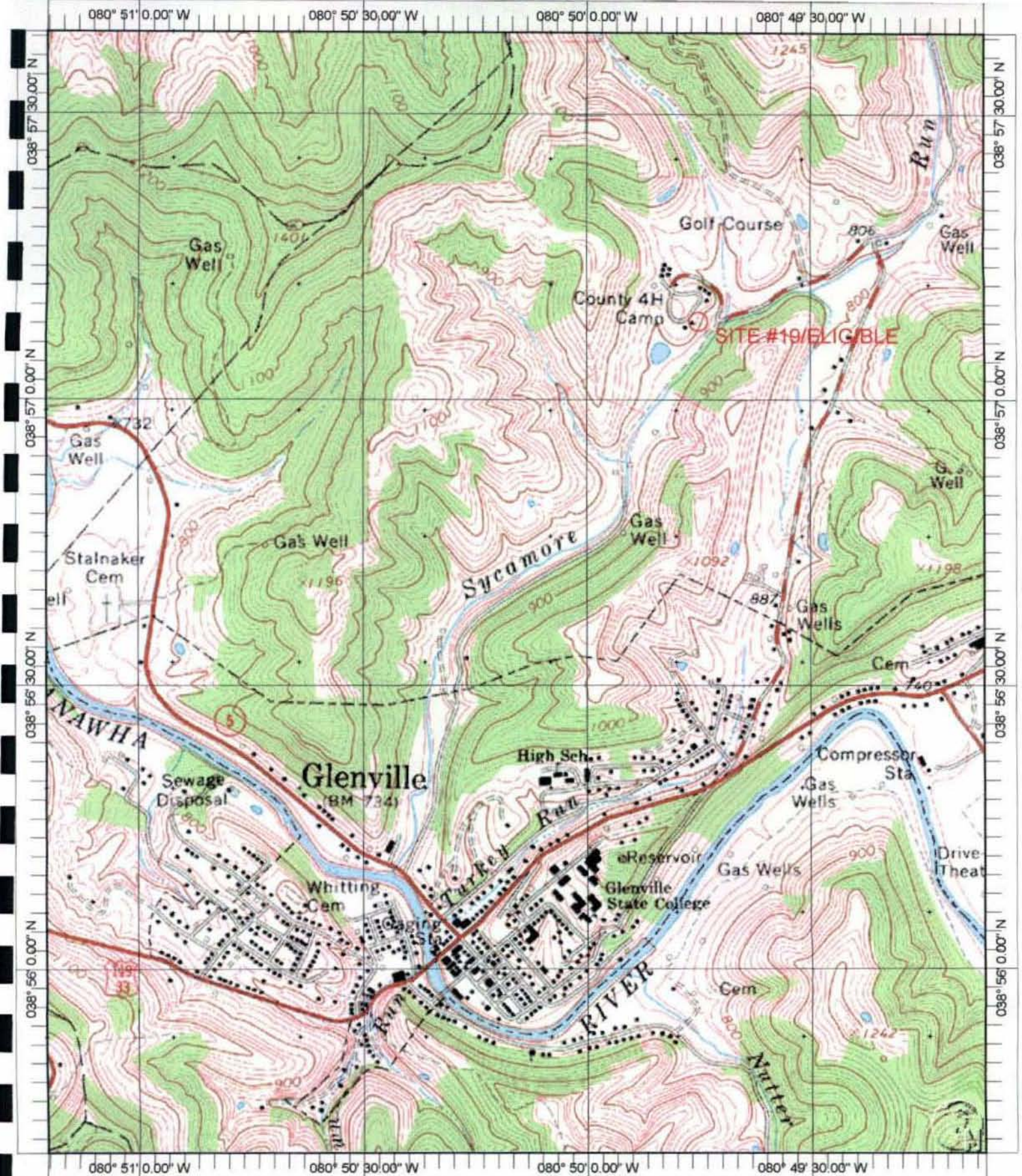

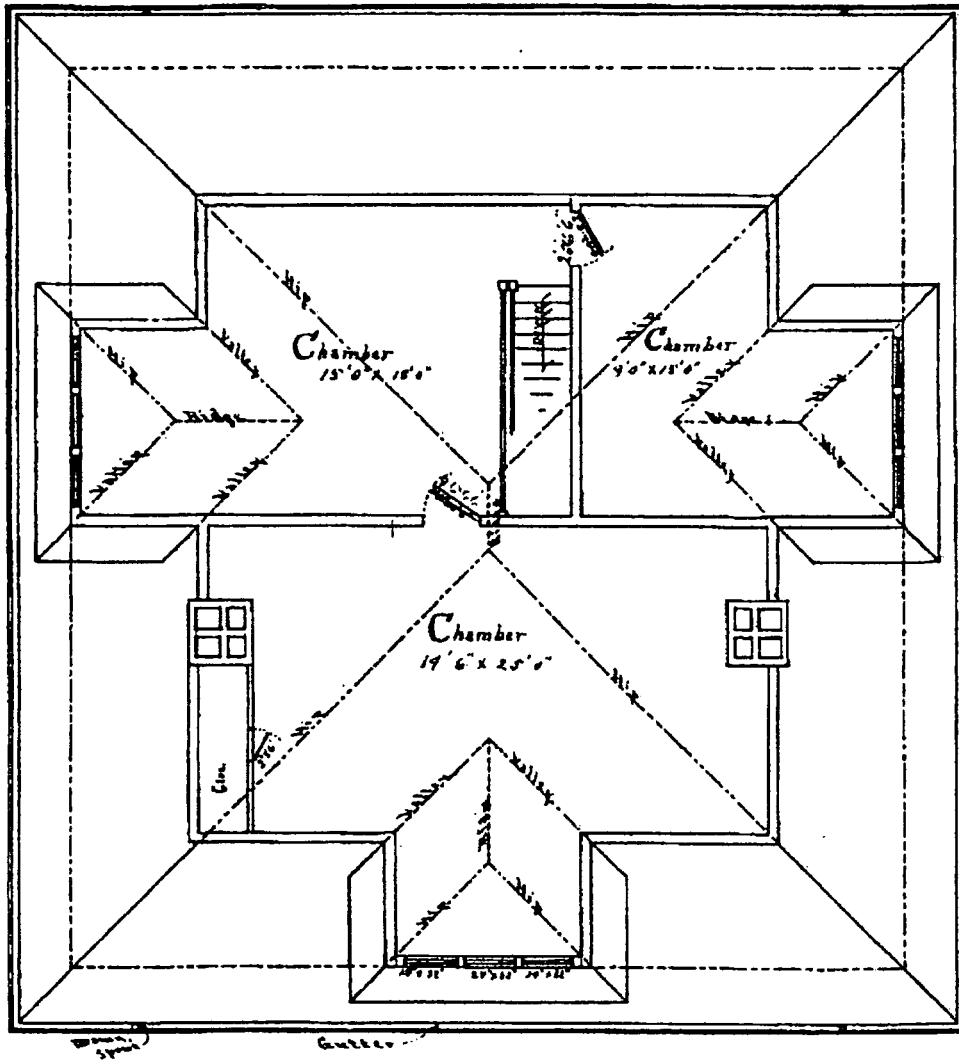
SECTIONAL VIEW

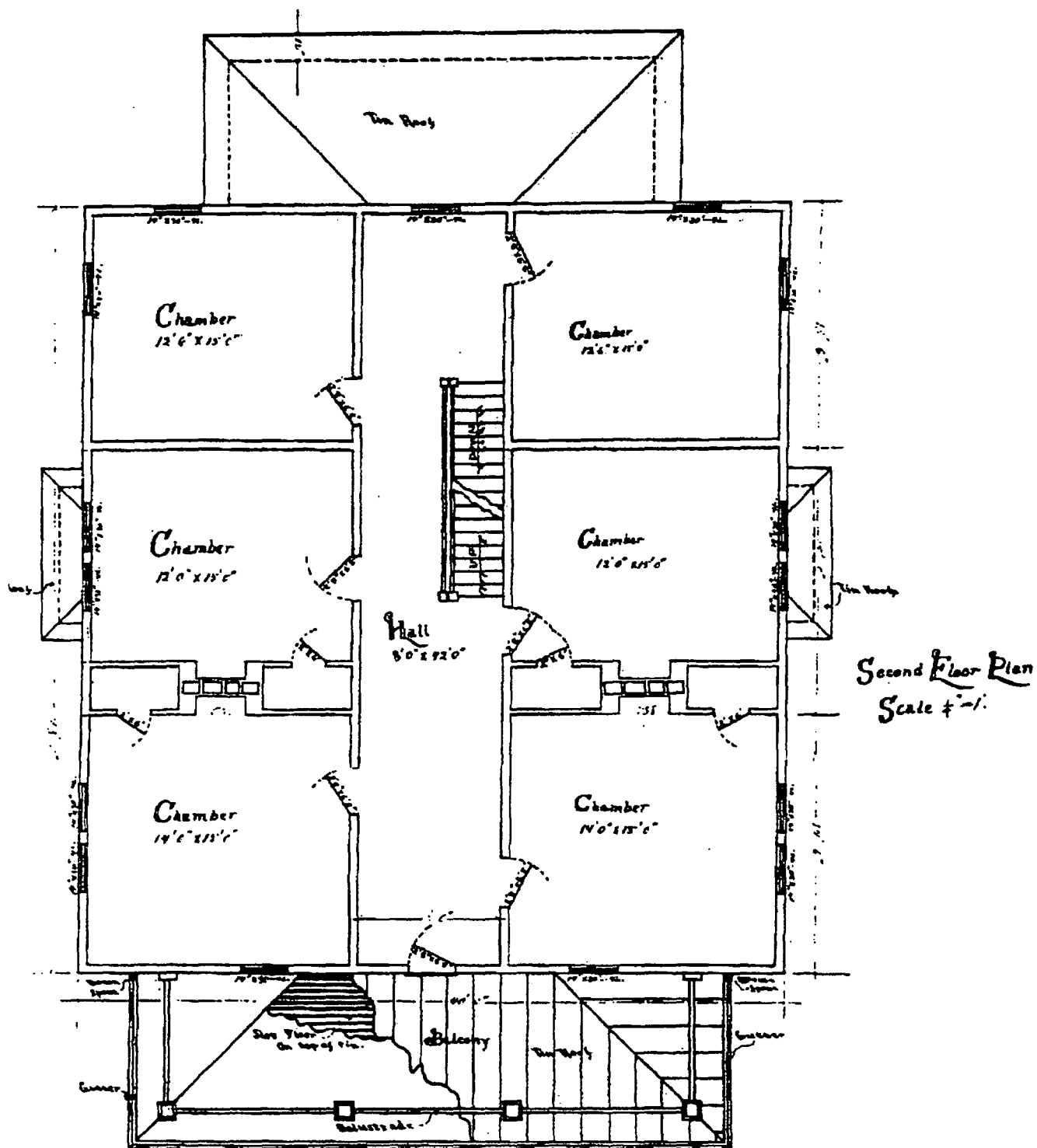
First Floor Plan

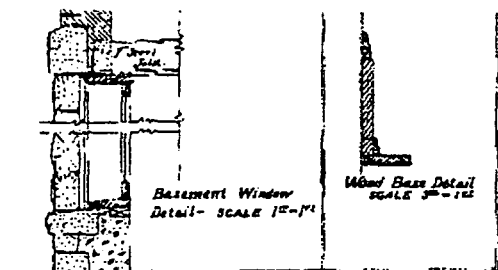


Basement Plan

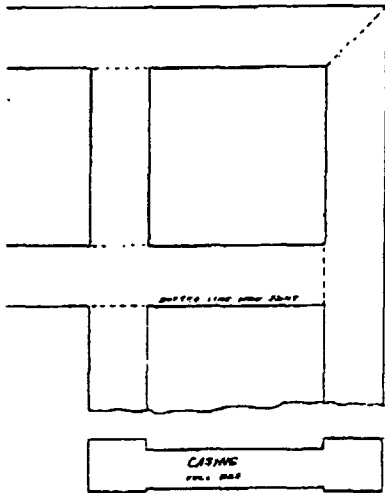


REAR ELEVATION

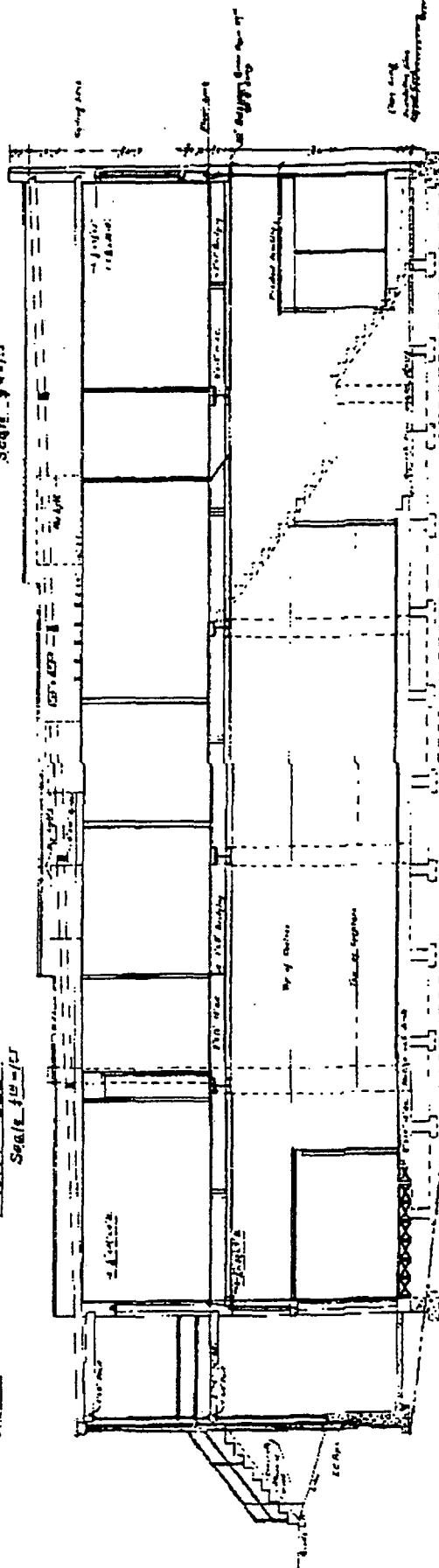
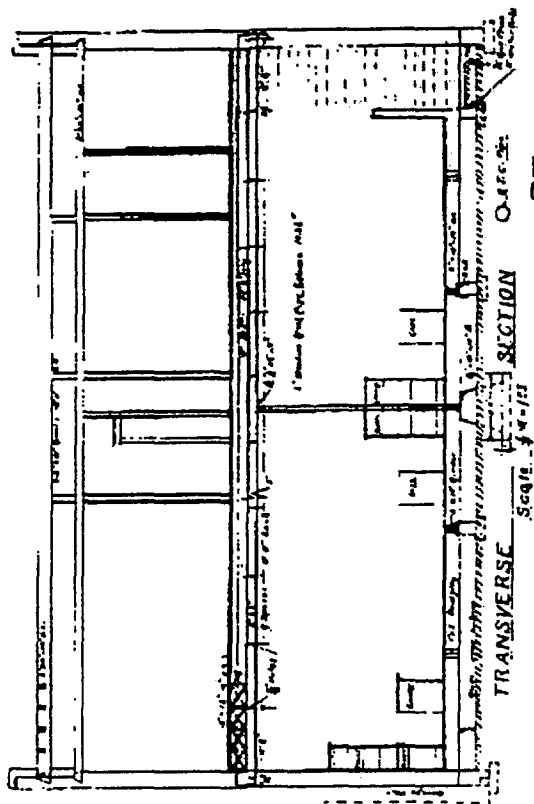
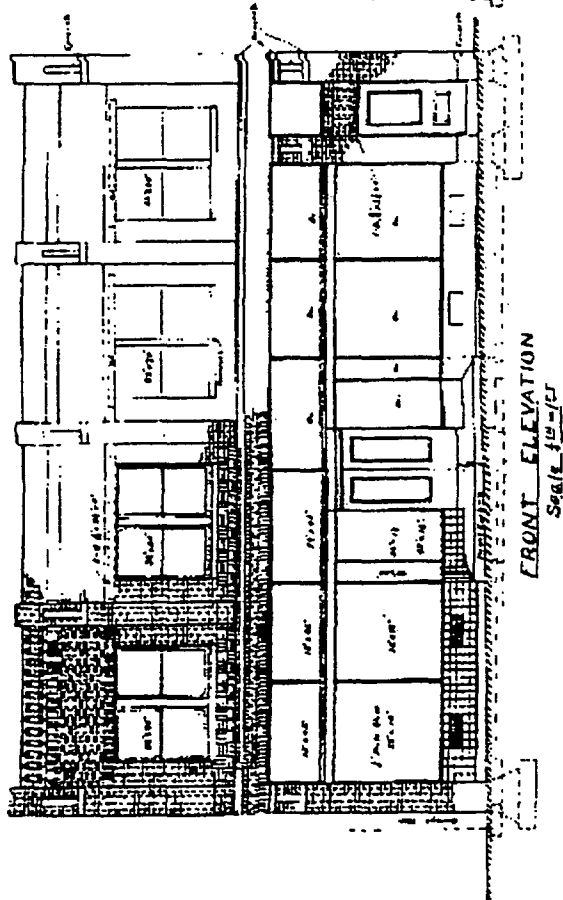


LEWIS STREET SIDE ELEVATION

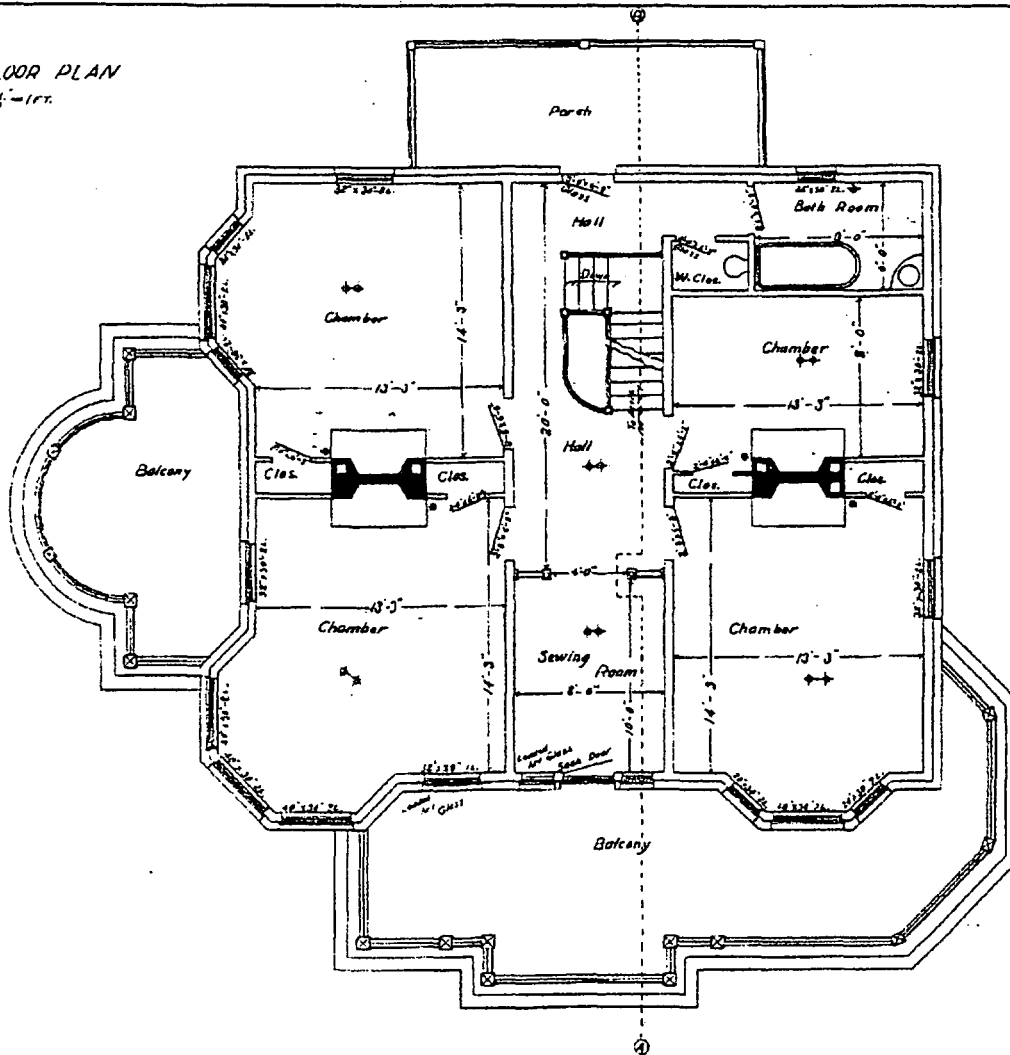

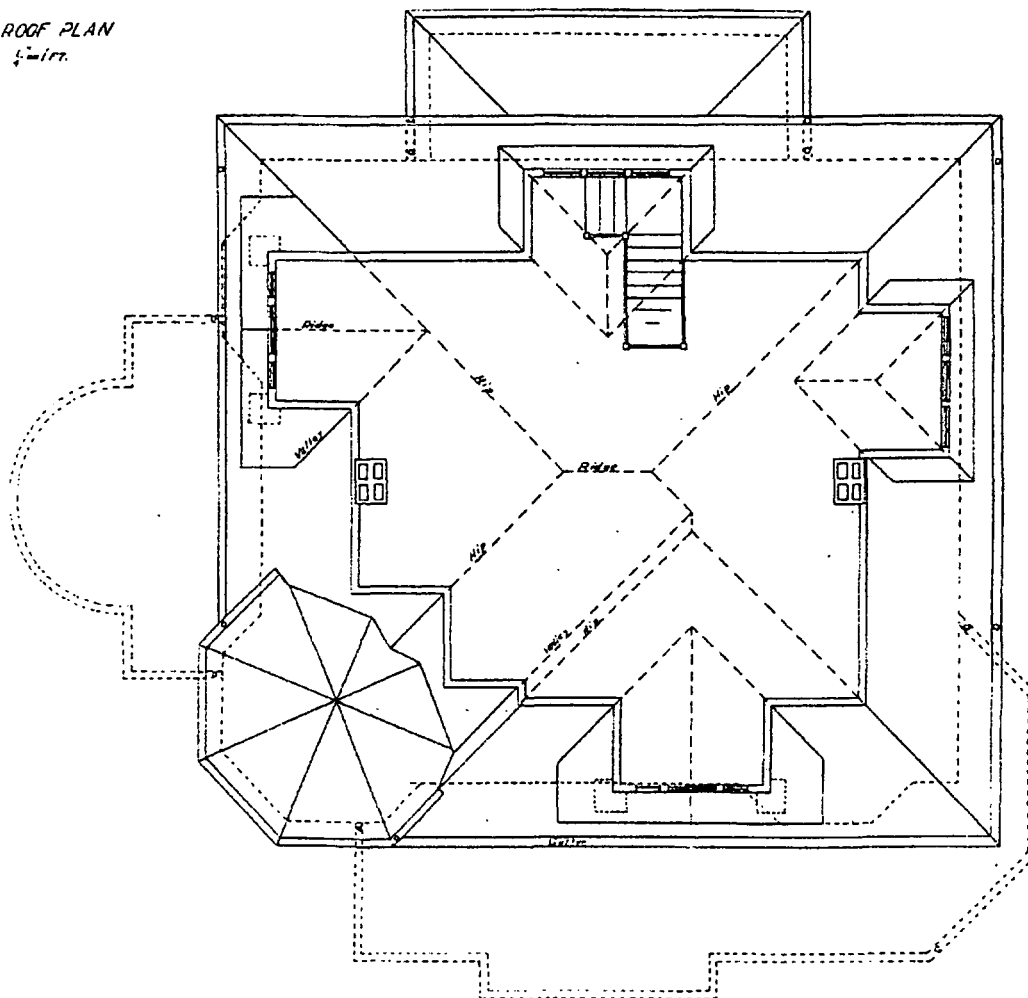
FIRST FLOOR PLAN

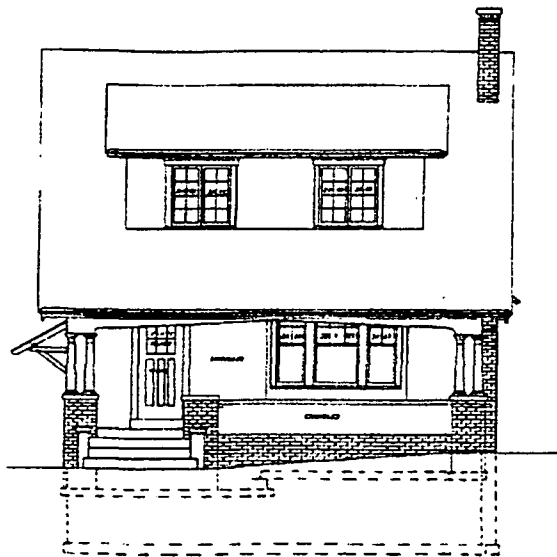


SECOND FLOOR PLAN

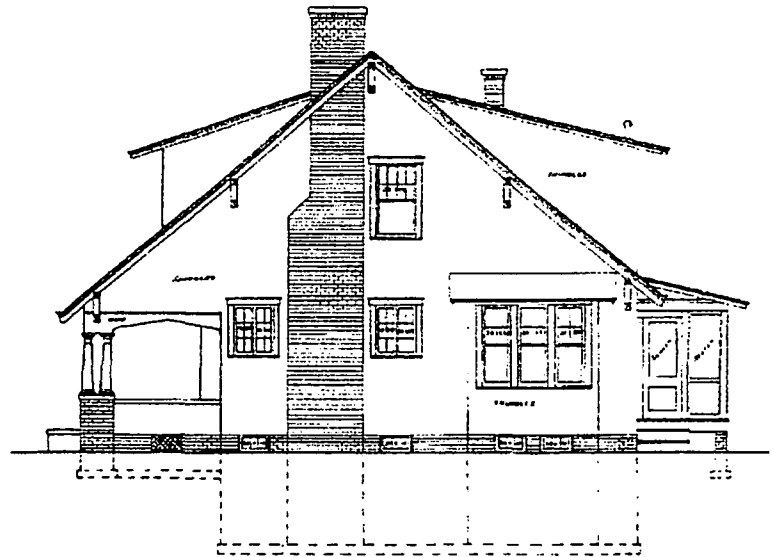
ATTIC and ROOF PLAN

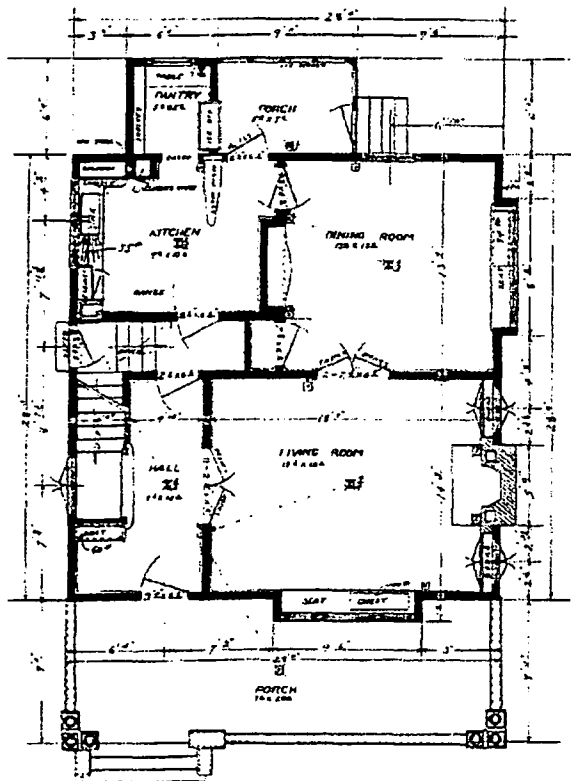

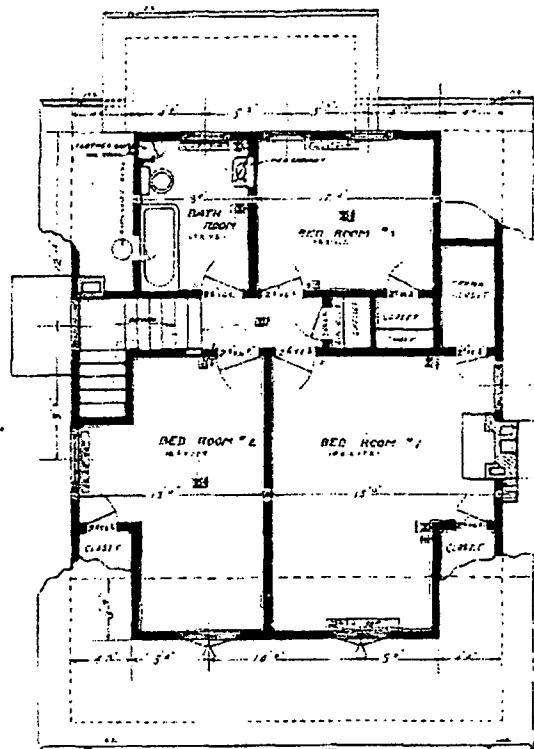
NORTH EAST SIDE ELEVATION

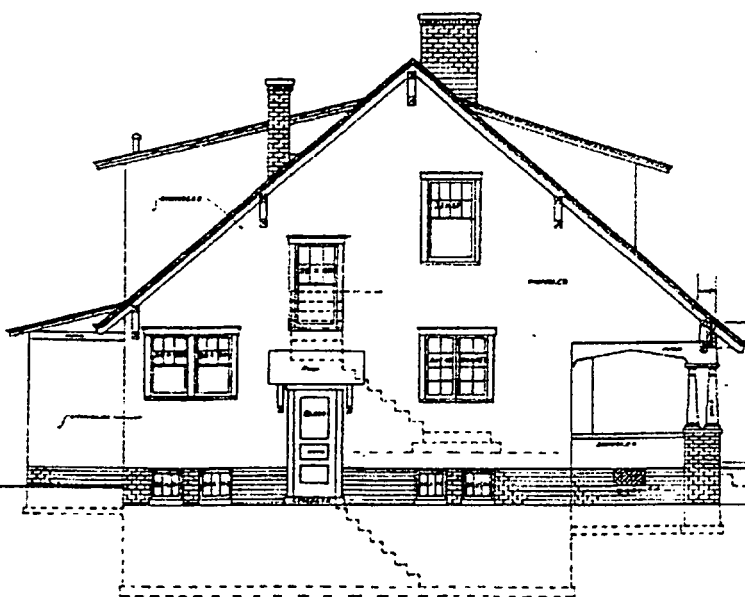
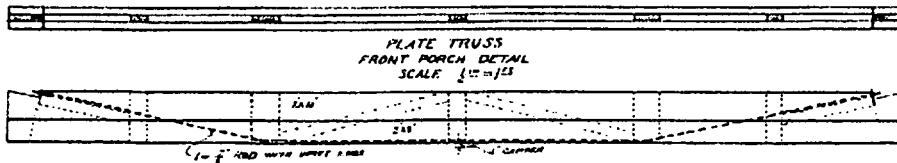
FIRST FLOOR PLAN

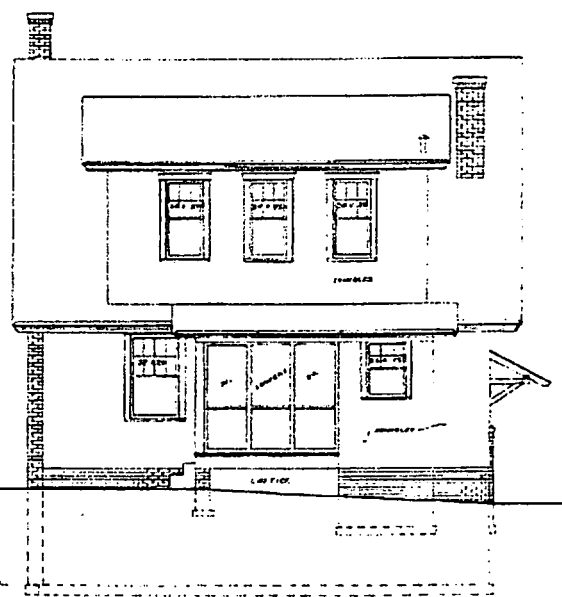


SECOND FLOOR PLAN
